The feeding habits of the raven are similar to those of other gregarious game birds and the place to hunt him mornings and evenings is where he feeds. In the middle of the day he is usually in the most impenetrable cover he can find — willows, blackberry thickets, and patches of hardwood or bog swamps. The pheasant will eat anything that a domestic chicken will eat. That certainly gives him plenty of variety, but in a country where grain is raised look for him around those fields. When he can't get grain he does well on weed seeds. A good bird hunter spends much time looking at the ground. The

hunter you are able to hunt from the larger yard. The pheasant will be. To the pheasant the pheasant is an easy mark, but other beginners have a terrible time hitting a long-tailed rooster. He is big and gaudy and makes a racket when he comes out, usually adding a raucous cackle to the noise of his wings. That's hard on the noryes. More important is the fact that he flies faster than most people realize and to kill him it is necessary to put the shot in the front third part of the target. That long tail makes many a man shoot behind a pheasant or hit him so far back that it won't stop him.
