Some precautions are: Have a portable type water extinguisher handy. If you have a pressure system, have spigots fitted for hose.

Have proper extinguishers for electrical and flamable liquid fires.

Don't use water on that kind of flames. Keep a ladder long enough to reach the highest roof.

To prevent fires, don't smoke in the barn, in bed, or near flamable liquids. Don't overload a wiring system. Don't operate tractor in the barn. Don't store fuel in buildings; store in tanks and put them on a downward slope from build

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
