This trio, tops the U. S. Dept. of

Agriculture's November plentiful foods list, Miss Clontz said.
The turkey crop for this year is a record high, cranberry production is at a near record, and the apple crop, is 10 per cent above average.
As good vegetable buys, Miss Clontz suggested onions, cabbage, carrots, Irish potatoes, and sweet potatoes -- all on the November plentiful list.
The list also include hens, broilers, fryers and pork, as well as eggs and cheese, butter and honey.
