Beulaville Church Is Scene Of Brinson-Brinson Wedding

Wildlife Commission to Hold Hearing In Raleigh And Set Fishing Rules

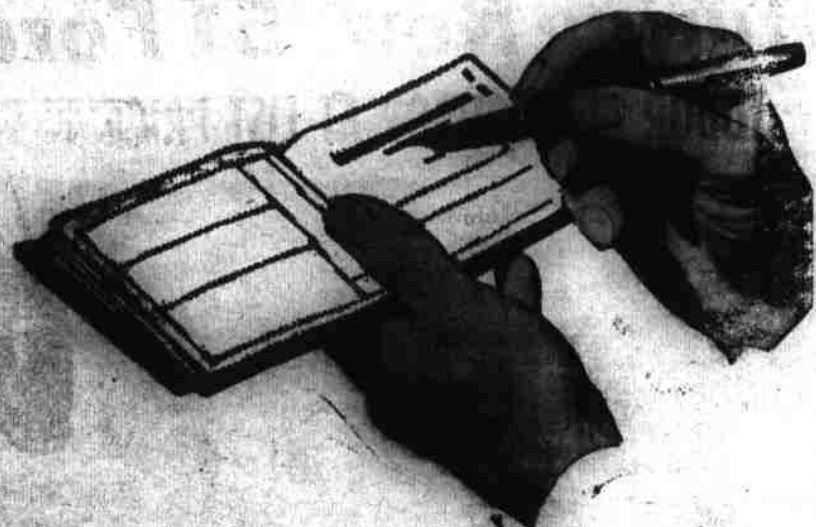
The N. C. Wildlife Resources Commission will hold its annual public hearing in the 1951 fishing regulations Monday, Nov. 13, in the Hall of the House of Representatives in Raleigh. Executive Director C. P. Patton announced today.

Individual and groups interested in expressing opinions regarding the setting of next year's fishing regulations will be welcomed at 9:30 A. M. After hearing and considering the recommendations of interested sportsmen, the Commission will go into session to set the official fishing regulations for

the coming year. It is expected that there will be very few changes over current regulations. The Commission plans to have the new regulations published and distributed before January 1, 1951.
