Tide Water To Spend \$17,000 In **Duplin County**

Warsaw, N. C., Nov. 3 - Two work orders, part of a \$2,500,000 construction program, were received by Ralph Applewhite, manager of the Warsaw Branch of the Tide Water Power Company to provide \$17,000 for additions and improvements to electric service in the Warsaw-Wallace area.

The first of these work orders, in the amount of \$2,050.70, provides for the increasing the copper and transformer on East Boney St. East Railroad St. and East Main St. in Wallace. This will materially better service to many businesses.

St. in Wallace. This will materially better service to many businesses, in this immediate section including the Danca Theatre, Radio Station WRRZ, Johnson Cotton Company and Town Hall.

The second work order, in the amount of \$14,537.50, provides for the installation of regulators which will increase the capacity for step voltage regulation in the towns of Magnolia, Calypso, Penderlea and Beulaville.

These orders to start work in Duplin and Pender Counties are part of Tide Water's system-wide construction program to bulld backbone strength throughout South and North Carolina Tide Water's engineers have estimated and the Company has budgeted a program to cost \$2,500,000 for construction and expansion during the years 1950-51. 
