

Highway Commission Adds 2,282 Miles Of Paving In Three Months

The State Highway Commission broke another all-time roadbuilding record during the third quarter of 1950 by completing 2,282.7 miles of secondary road paving.

Highway Chairman Henry W. Jordan reported today that this mileage, added to the total finished since January, 1949, represents 38.8 per cent of the 12,000-mile paving goal requested by Governor Scott when he took office.

During a 20-months period, the Commission has added 4,658.5 miles of new hard-surfacing to the state's secondary road system. The Commission's Engineer of Statistics and Planning, James S. Burch, says that no other roadbuilding organization has paved as much as 2,282 miles in an area the size of North Carolina during a three-month period.

Good progress made on the \$200,000,000 program up to this point assures its completion within the next 18 to 24 months barring wartime scarcities or other unforeseen conditions.

The Highway Commission's 6th Division, led by Dairyman George S. Coble, reported the greatest portion of its program finished. Some 864 miles already have been paved in that division, representing about 67 per cent of the original goal. Because of unexpected economics, some divisions will exceed their original quotas.

As of September 10, the Commission had finished roughly 20 per cent of its 35,000-mile stabilization goal.

The third quarter report from the highway auditor's office showed that \$95,352,110.76 of the \$125,000,000 in road bonds already sold has been allocated to specific projects. Of this amount \$54,061,737.66 has been spent.

Salt & Soda First Aid For Shock From Burns

The simple rules for using salt and soda water by mouth as first aid for serious shock from burns are outlined in a leaflet issued by

the Public Health Service, Federal Security Agency.

In releasing the leaflet, titled, "The A. B. C's of Salt and Soda for Shock and Burns", Surgeon General Leonard A. Scheele pointed out that "in the salt and soda solution, given by mouth, we have a practical and highly effective first-aid against shock, the major killing factor in burns and many injuries."

The text emphasizes that any badly burned person needs the care of a doctor as soon as possible. He also needs first aid for shock immediately. He may be saved from shock -- and even death -- by giving him salt and soda in water to drink at the earliest possible moment.

The salt solution consists of 1 level teaspoon of common table salt and 1/2 teaspoon of baking soda (bicarbonate of soda) dissolved in 1 quart of cool water. A burned person should drink this, and nothing else. As much as 10 quarts may be necessary.

Cotton Prices Up

The continued strong demand for cotton last week sent prices moderately higher, the PMA reported. Since the middle of October, middling 15-16-inch staple has gained \$11 a bale.

By the close Thursday of last week, prices for middling 15-16-inch averaged 40.09 cents a pound in the 10 spot markets, compared with 39.73 a week earlier, and 29-85 cents a pound a year ago.

Reported sales in the 10 spot markets totaled 364,200 bales in the week, compared with 375,400 the week before and 367,300 bales in the same week of last year.

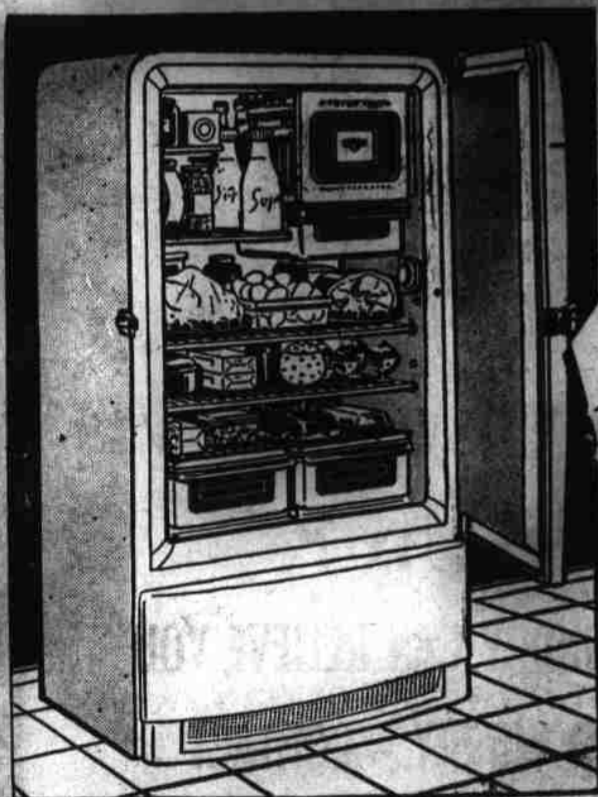
Subject Announced For Speaking Event
