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## State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

QUESTION: Please explain the provisions of the new social security legislation as it affects farm workers.  
ANSWER: The expanded legislation covers hired farm and domestic workers (cooks or household workers on the farm) who are employed regular. A worker is considered regular if (1) he works continuously for one farm operator during the entire calendar quarter and (2) he continues to do farm work for at least 60 days for the same employer in the succeeding calendar quarter and receives \$50 or more cash wages for his work. He also is a regular worker if he is paid \$50 or more cash wages in a calendar quarter and was a regular worker for this same employer in the preceding calendar quarter.

The first quarter begins January 1. A worker who has worked all of the fourth quarter of 1950 can be covered for social security beginning January 1, 1951. Thereafter a worker must work 60 days and earn at least \$50 in cash in every three-month period to get continuous social security credit.  
Farm workers should make sure they have a social security card. This may be obtained from the nearest social security office or through the local post office. The card should be shown to the farm operator by whom the worker is regularly employed.  
The operator must have the exact name and number shown on the card to report the worker's wages every three months. The operator will deduct the social security tax

from the worker's wages and add an equal amount as his own payment.  
The tax through 1951 is 3 percent -- one-half deducted from the farm operator and the other half from the worker. The operator will send this money to the government.

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
