**Building Basement Floor**

A 6- to 12-inch fill of coarse aggregate is necessary to make sure a concrete basement floor will be



Fill must be thoroughly tamped, watertight, says American Builder magazine. The fill then should be covered with 15-pound asphalt-saturated felt, which is coated with hot asphalt. The reinforced concrete placed on top of this should be 4 inches thick. American Builder says a frequent practice is to insulate floors with a 4-inch-thick layer of concrete made with vermiculite, or other lightweight aggregate, placed under the top slab. This minimizes heat loss and condensation.

**CONSERVATION BOARD PLANS FOR FISHERIES MEETING**

Commercial Fisheries laws and regulations will be discussed at a number of public hearings to be conducted by the Commercial Fisheries Committee of the State Board of Conservation and Development planned for next week according to Roy Hampton, chairman of the Commercial Fisheries Committee.

The Attorney General's Office has recently completed the job of assembling and bringing up to date all state laws as related to commercial fisheries. In so doing, it was found that there are about 3,000 local county laws dealing with commercial fishing, many of which appear to have outlived their usefulness.

George R. Ross, Director of the Department of Conservation and Development, says that an effort has been made to study and bring up to date these local conflicting laws and that a series of meetings have been planned, at which time county legislative representatives, commercial fisheries interests, and county officials of the area are invited to attend and discuss with the Board the repeal of conflicting, obsolete, or unnecessary statutes. Public hearings have been arranged for 11:00 a.m. in the following order, and with the exception of Morehead City, all meetings will be held in the Court House (if available): Nov. 27, Southport; Nov. 28, Jacksonville; Nov. 29, Morehead

City (Commercial Fisheries Section Base); Dec. 1, Swansquarter; Dec. 2, Manteo; Dec. 3, Edenton.

Serving on the Conservation Board's Commercial Fisheries Committee are Roy Hampton of Plymouth, Chairman; Mrs. Roland McClamroch of Chapel Hill; Fred P. Latham of Belhaven; Eric W. Rodgers of Scotland Neck; and Dr. Sylvester Green of Chapel Hill.
