

Tobacco Stabilization Corporation Growers-Members On Increase

Raleigh, N. C., Dec. 3.—More than 285,000 grower-members of the Fine-Cured Tobacco Cooperative Stabilization Corporation from Virginia to Florida will receive \$4,195,416.15 -- the net gain from 1947 crop loan operations, General Manager L. T. Weeks, Raleigh, announced today.

Distribution of the dividend from operations covering 232,000,000 pounds of tobacco, Weeks said, will begin early in January and run for a month or six weeks. He added that this is the first such dividend paid since operations began in 1946.

"Deliveries on 1947 tobacco taken under loan were completed about 10 days ago. The \$4,195,416.15 represents approximately 5 1/4% of the amount paid for the tobacco when received by the corporation," he said.

Weeks said distribution will be made on a dollar-value basis of tobacco received by the corporation. Due to address changes, he said, many checks will probably be returned, so all growers who have had an address change since 1947 are urged to notify the Stabilization Corporation, 522 Fayetteville Street, Raleigh, N. C., to assure receipt of their check.

The General Manager said a statement of 1947 crop loan operations, showing total amounts of money involved, and a letter with general information about the corporation will accompany the checks.

"In addition," Weeks said, "new plastic identification cards will be sent to growers to replace those issued when the producers paid their \$5.00 membership fee and received a certificate for one share of common stock. The new card will prove more serviceable and all growers are urged to keep it as its proper use will insure correct identification for any future dis-

tribution of net gains." Weeks pointed out that any distribution from 1946, 1949 and 1950 operations would have to be determined when the handling of tobacco from each of those years is completed.

Negro 4-H Club Achievement Day Observed Warsaw

The Annual 4-H Achievement Day was held at the Douglass High School in Warsaw, Thursday of last week with all 13 clubs represented and some 750 members attending. Mr. J. E. Belton, Principal of Duplin Training School was guest speaker. He reviewed the history of the 4-H club, its objectives and its program and pointed out practical ways in which club work enriches the lives of rural girls and boys. Aside from his school matters Mr. Belton has been energetic and aggressive in community life.

Each club placed educational exhibits, with Falson, Magnolia and Warsaw Senior club, taking top honors, Calypso and Little Creek Junior clubs made up second place winners, while Wallace, Chinquapin, Rose Hill, Beulaville, Branch, Warsaw Junior, Kenansville and Teachey comprised third place winners.

Individual prizes for county championship projects were: a calf, Alex L. Judge of Chinquapin; sweet potatoes, Robert Smith, Rose Hill; and corn, Ben Miller, Kenans-

ville; champion projects were: canning, Magnolia, Miller, Kenansville; Food Preparation, Ella Mae Batts, Rose Hill; and clothing, Lucy Mae Green, Branch.

Kenansville was credited as having turned in the highest number of record books, and Falson with the highest number of delegates attending.

Featured also on the program was an exhibit on Highway Safety placed by Mr. Gates T. Matthews, district supervisor for the highway safety division. Mr. Matthews explained how 4-H's can participate in reducing highway fatalities on our highways.
