

Some Facts About Pasture Program In Duplin Co.

The Agricultural Conservation Program gave a big boost to efforts to provide more and better pastures on Duplin County farms during the 1950 calendar year.

Some 1350 county farmers seeded 4152 acres of permanent pastures with 50 percent of the "out-of-the-pocket" cost furnished through the ACP, Joe E. Sloan, Chairman of the Duplin County Production and Marketing Administration Committee, announced this week.

The PMA Chairman pointed out that this acreage represents an increase of 1422 acres seeded to pastures by farmers under the ACP last year.

Pasture seed, made available to participating farmers through the program's purchase order system, included 8304 pounds of ladino, 2431 pounds of orchard grass; and 37563 pounds of fescue.

Farmers who obtain pasture seed under the program are always assured of high quality seed, the farm leader said, "as only seed meeting high germination and purity tests are made available."

Not only in Duplin County, but throughout the State, farmers are taking advantage of services offered through the ACP to aid them establish more and better permanent pastures. Recent announcement by G. Tom Scott, State PMA Chairman, Raleigh, reveals that 255,500 acres of permanent pastures were seeded in the State with ACP assistance during the 1950 calendar year. This compares with 167,228 acres under the program last year, and 98,000 acres in 1948.

Pasture seed made available through the purchase order plan to participating farmers throughout the State included 1,549,591 pounds of orchard grass; 987,021 of fescue; 15,030 white dutch clover and 437,658 of ladino clover.

"Assistance provided under the Agricultural Conservation Program," Scott said, "has proved the most effective and efficient means of getting essential conservation work done on the land of individual farmers."

"This method of assistance does not require the farmer to pay, in the initial outlay, the entire cost of seeding or improving pasture acreage; and therefore, has been an incentive for many farmers, financially unable to bear the entire cost at seeding time, to take advantage of the pasture practice," Scott explained.

"The share of cost provided under the ACP also represents the public interest and in conservation of the soil," he added.

The Agricultural Conservation Program is available to all farmers in Duplin County. With the 1951 program already approved, farmers are urged to visit their county PMA office at Kenansville, N. C. to discuss their conservation needs for the coming year.

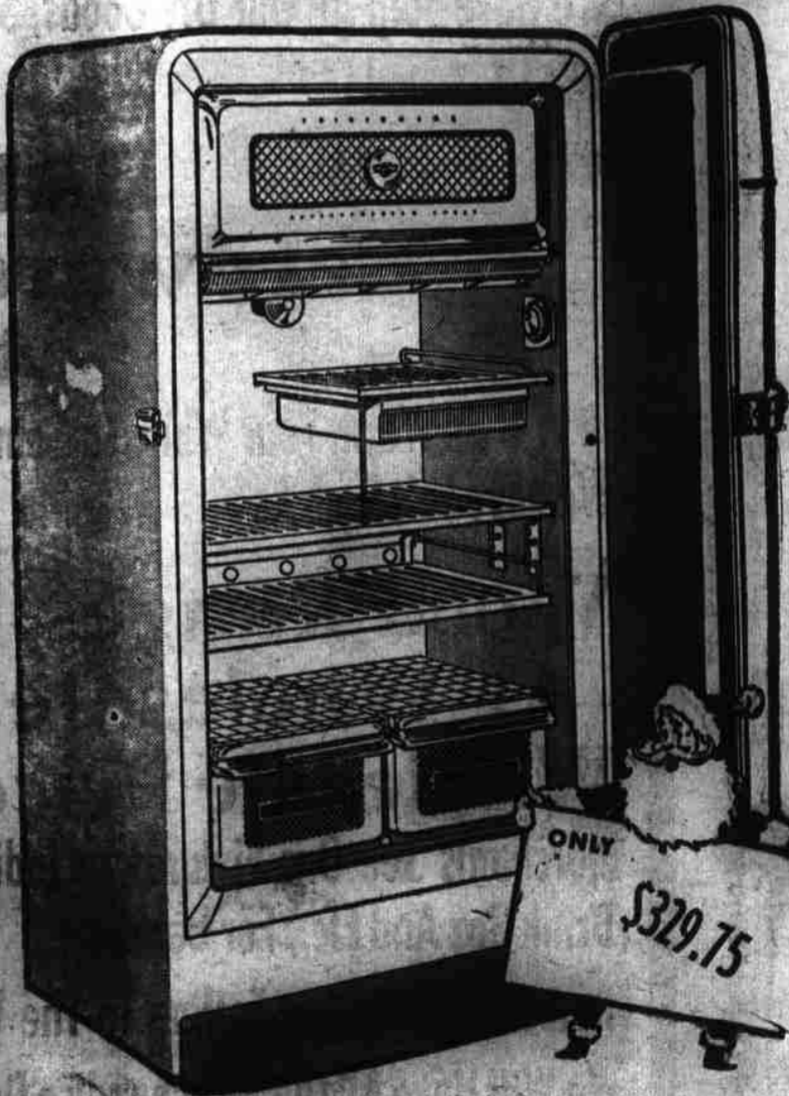
