Duplin Negro Farmer Has Had A Busy Year

This has been a busy year for Arthur Graham, Negro farmer of Rt. 1, Magnolia.

Riddick E. Wilkins, Duplin County Negro far manager for the State College Extension Service, says Graham is doing something about increasing the comforts and conveniences on his place.

Early in 1950, W. L. Turner, ex-

cellent farm management specialist, visited the Graham farm, which contains more than 50 acres, and outlined ways of more efficient land use and home comfort. One of the most important recommendations was seeding permanent pasture.

Graham has long been rated as a skilled livestock dealer, but feed has been one of his big problems. Now he has seeded six acres of Ladino cover pasture and fenced it. In addition, during 1950 he also has made major improvements to the home, including adding a bathroom, installing modern fixtures, underpinning the house, and installing concrete porches.

The Duplin farmer is attempting to follow recommendations of the State College extension farm management department as closely as possible. His daughter, Arthenia, a student at Mary Potter's boarding school at Oxford, was a blue ribbon winner at the 1949 southeastern district dairy calf show.
