Grand Jury Report

Duplin Superior court grand jury returned nine true bills and concentrated on noting conditions of school buildings. They returned their report to Superior Court Judge Chester Morris.

The grand jury recommended the replacement of grates in the stoves of Calypso Negro school "immediately," and the replacement of the building as soon as possible.

Other schools were: Beulaville Negro school, toilets and windows in poor condition; Magnolia school,

... through the roof should be stopped, wiring very poor, bathroom pipes leaking in yard.

The report on the county agricultural building showed a leaking roof and poor plaster condition inside. Recommended new paint, wiring, new doors to rest rooms new window lights.

New steps were recommended for the county welfare building. The grand jury reported both the jail and prison in good shape. (Ed. note): It might be well to call to the attention of our readers that the conditions referred to in the Negro schools will be eliminated when the new consolidated school for Negroes at Charity is completed. The report could leave the wrong impression as it reads. The grand jury could have inspected the new building under construction and reported that officials were clearing up conditions as fast as possible.

He was the son of Pearl Rouse and Fred O. Hollingsworth. He had made his home in Roseboro for the past seven years and at the time of his death was employed by the Wheatley Motor Co. in Fayetteville. He was a member of the Roseboro Fire Department and a veteran of World War II.

**Farmers May Now
Order Sheep**

A number of inquiries have been made by farmers seeking to buy sheep to start farm flocks. The N. C. Dept. of Agriculture Livestock Division is now taking orders for breeding ewes for delivery next summer. If a person wants to buy some ewes, he may place his order for the number desired by making a \$5 per head deposit. Check should be made payable to N. C. Department of Agriculture, and mailed to the County Agent, or direct to Mr. Paul L. Fletcher, in Charge of Livestock Marketing, N. C. Dept. of Agriculture, Raleigh, N. C.

It is expected that these northwestern ewes will cost from \$38.00 to \$42 per head delivered to N. C. Unloading stations. Many farmers are seeking more livestock to go on permanent pastures. For a person who likes sheep this is a good opportunity to obtain some good breeding stock.
