

# Woodland Need Trimming?

Do your woodlands need thinning? You can tell by looking at the trees. Pine should be grown so that one-third the length of the trees is living limbs. If there is more than one-third the length of the tree with living limbs on it, there are not enough trees per acre. If the trees have less than one-third their length in living limbs, there are too many trees per acre.

When trees need thinning the top of the tree is not large enough to make the trunk grow as fast as it should. The small volume put on by many trees is not equal to a larger volume of growth put on by properly spaced trees. When the trees remain too thick for several years, the limbs on trees will be shaded too much and the limbs will die. When the limbs have died all but a very small top, that tree will take many years before it is able to put on growth that is necessary for landowners to profitably grow trees.

Many people have the idea that growing trees crowded will make them taller. This is not true. The only thing that affects the height of a tree is the soil that it grows on. The good shading does a tree to make the limbs that are shade the worst, die. This is good but there should be a large enough top left to make the trees grow and produce a profit.

Trees may need thinning at all ages. Trees grown in old fields may need thinning before they are pulpwood size. This would bring no financial returns, but the Federal Government considered the work so necessary that payment of \$5 per

acre has been authorized to carry out the cost of operation. When the trees become pulpwood and saw log size, the operation will pay for itself.

When thinning, the better trees should be left for future growth. Saw logs are the products that most wood lots are grown for and saw logs are the products that sell for the most money, except for some woodlots that produce poles and piling. It is best to save the better trees and let them grow into more profitable products. Fence posts, pulpwood, small saw logs, and small poles should only be cut when the lot is crowded.

If you have a wood lot, old field or stand of trees that need thinning it should be thinned now, before growth starts this spring. The Department of Conservation and Development will offer free advice and marking assistance for the thinning. Contact your County Forest Ranger or Farm Forester Tom Rhyne, Whiteville, N. C.
