J. P. Stevens Company Host To 250 At Get Acquainted Dinner In Wallace

Two hundred and fifty friends in the J. P. Stevens Company, one of the nation's largest textile industries which is opening a new textile plant in Wallace, were guests of the Stevens Company at a turkey dinner in the American Legion last in Wallace Wednesday night. The meeting was a get acquainted meeting of friends and officials of the Stevens Company.

The Wallace plant will be operated by the Carter Fabrics Division of the J. P. Stevens Company and will be managed by a native son of Duplin, Milton Southerland, son of Alexander Southerland of Wallace. Construction is well under way on the new factory located between the railroad and highway 11.

Milton Southerland presided and acted as toastmaster for the occasion. Rev. Wm. B. Hood gave the invocation. Mayor Willard Hoffer of Wallace welcomed the officers of the Stevens Company and the guests. Every person present was asked to stand and give their name and address. Mayor Hoffer then gave special recognition to the following: J. S. Blair, Dr. Bland, Melvin Cording, E. J. Johnson, D. B. Townsend, Dr. Robinson, Dr. Cowell, Roy Carter, D. L. Wells, Harry Kramer (absent), O. C. Blanchard, Jr., W. C. Worley, and A. C. Hall. This group, he said, was a committee who aided to a large extent in securing the location of the plant in Wallace.

W. J. Carter, executive vice-president and director of the J. P. Stevens Company, was called on and he thanked the group for the fine spirit of cooperation shown by the entire community of Wallace.

Mr. Southerland then recognized officials present of the Carter Fabrics division of the J. P. Stevens Company who will manage and operate the Wallace plant. They were: F. B. Pinson, manager purchasing department (supplies); George Henn, manager engineering department; Paisley Boney (native of Wallace), purchasing department; J. A. Mallard (native of Wallace), manager contracts and allocation department; W. T. Stockton, manager accounting department and assistant to the executive officer, Mr. W. J. Carter; George Thompson, manager trucking department; John S. Patterson, director of public and industrial relations; J. A. White, general manager Republic Cotton Mills and assistant general manager of Carter Fabrics, operating president of Wallace plant; J. A. Brady, personnel and office manager, Wallace plant; John T. Montgomery and Williams M. Morehead.

Following this recognition Mr. Harry C. Carter, vice-president and director of J. P. Stevens and Company, Inc., and general manager of the Carter Fabrics operating group of plants, addressed the group on the subject "Textiles in Your Community". WEEKLY LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY

This is the 7th of a series of weekly summaries of the work of the North Carolina General Assembly of 1951. It is confined to discussions of matters of general interest and major importance.

The 1951 General Assembly has begun reaching decisions. Some were reached on the floor this week and others reached in committee. The joint appropriations committee has completed hearings; other committees have acted and reported on recent bills before them, leaving only recent introductions for study. This clearing of committee business, the speed-up in calendar action, and an obvious tendency for members to introduce bills they have been waiting to introduce.

County Library To Expand Work

Miss Dorothy Wightman, Duplin County Librarian, has been relieved of her duty as part time librarian in Onslow County, Onslow has now obtained a full time librarian.

Miss Wightman has been working in Onslow two days a week for the past two years and has been Duplin County Librarian for over three years.

The change will permit more time for Book Mobile trips scheduled for Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays of each week. There were 12 Book Mobile stops when Miss Wightman came to the county and at present there are 43 stops with an additional ten planned. The stops for Thursday and Friday have been too long for adequate service.

Mondays and Saturdays will be left open for county work, delivering, schools, specials, etc.

The Kenansville Library will be open all day Wednesdays. There are at present five libraries in Duplin County. They are in Kenansville, Warsaw, Wallace, Faison and the last one established at Rose Hill.

A complete schedule will be published later with changes and new stops listed.

Since July 1947 books have been added to the county library books. Nearly 150 new adult novels have been obtained during the month of February. The total circulation in the county is 5991.

National Guard Needs 60 Men

The National Guard wants to enlist 60 men from Duplin County to form two platoons of the Medical Company of the 119th Infantry, according to Capt. G. V. Gooding, Commander of the local unit.

The Medical Company at present is comprised of 212 men; 13 officers, 5 of which are physicians and 7 medical service officers. Among the 190 enlisted men there are 5 Master Sergeants, 9 Sergeants 1st class, 26 Sergeants, 41 Corporals, 24 Privates 1st class, 25 Privates, and the remainder serve as fillers.

To be eligible for service in the National Guard a man must be between the ages of 18 and 35 and physically fit. Any man interested in signing with the National Guard may do so at the Kenansville Gym every Monday night at 7:00 p.m.

The National Guard has been an important part of our country since its birth and your country needs every able-bodied man. You will earn good pay while learning. From \$2.50 for a recruit to \$10.00 for a Captain per drill. You can qualify for retirement pay at the age of 60. Men in the National Guard will not be drafted.

1951 Red Cross Drive In Progress County Goal Set At \$5,000

The 1951 American Red Cross Drive began March first with the goal for the County set at \$5,000. The quota for the nation is 85 million dollars to help mobilize the nation's military and civilian resources for security.

March is designated as Red Cross Month with the Duplin County Fund Raising Drive planned for the first ten days of the month.

The county is responsible for the raising of \$4,976 for 1951. \$2,230 will remain in the county chapter and \$2,746 will go to the national quota.

The 1951 campaign slogan is "Mobilize for Defense". It is this mobilization that necessitates the large sum of money for carrying on the work of the Red Cross due to (1) Increased service made necessary by the expansion of our armed forces; (2) Procurement of blood for the armed forces and civilian defense; (3) Necessary increase in training in first aid, home nursing, and nurses' aids; (4) Higher costs of all materials and services as compared with a year ago.

Harry E. Kramer of Wallace is Chairman of the Duplin County Chapter. Mrs. N. B. Boney serves as Executive Secretary. Fund Campaign chairmen of each township have been selected to manage the drive in each of the townships.

Bostic, \$85; Beulaville - Bob Demorest, \$400; Calypso - Needham Sloan, \$400; Bowden - Mrs. Thelma Lloyd Bartlett, \$143; Wallace - Louis Shields, \$1050. The colored communities will be supervised by Miss Annie Mae Kenip.

Another Increase Tobacco Allotment Is Announced

Washington, Feb. 27. — Quotas for flue-cured tobacco will be increased 5% more for 1951 than those previously announced.

The Agriculture Department ordered the increase today and simultaneously announced an increase of 7% for the burley crop over crop marketing quotas previously announced.

The new increase will give Duplin farmers approximately 3,000 more acres or a total of approximately 23,000 acres of tobacco for 1951.

New marketing quotas for flue-cured at 1,297,000,000 pounds meaning that allotments for most flue-cured farms will be 14% greater in 1951 than in 1950. The 1951 quota set earlier was 1,235,000,000 pounds.

The flue-cured allotments will total about 1,120,000 acres, compared with 1,069,000 previously announced and 968,500 last year.

The increases were made, Secretary Brannan said, to assure ample supplies under the defense emergency.

He said a higher level of industrial activity is expected to increase the demand for tobacco products.

"As a consequence," he said, "the department wishes to be on the 'safe' side."
