Eclipse Of Sun Next Wednesday; Visible Here
 Late Wednesday afternoon of March 7, the first of two eclipses of the sun visible to North Carolinians this year will occur, according to astronomers of the Morehead Planetarium at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. The next one will be at sunrise Sept. 1.

Both eclipses, it is said, are of the annular or ring-type, in which the moon as it passes between the sun and the earth is not quite close enough to appear large enough to cover all of the sun's apparent disk. Of very little value scientifically, such an eclipse still remains an interesting spectacle to the casual observer, who can watch it safely through a piece of smoked glass or a very dark piece of photographic film.

The eclipse of March 7 will not be seen as annular in North Carolina, because the central path of the eclipse runs from New Zealand across the South Pacific and thru Nicaragua, ending in the Caribbean Sea between Haiti and South America, they explain. As a partial eclipse, however, this will be observed throughout the United States south and east of a line running from Los Angeles through Milwaukee, Wis. All of Mexico, Central America and about half of South America will be in the partial eclipse zone.

For the middle of North Carolina the eclipse will begin at 4:58 p.m. as the moon begins to intrude between the sun and earth. At 5:45 the eclipse will be maximum when the moon covers up 31% of the
