County Court

County Court will be held here Monday April 23rd with Judge Herbert Phillips presiding. Eighty-three cases are listed on the Court Calendar to be heard.

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Twenty Three Arrest Made In County Over Week-End; 19 Warrants Issued Sat.

Twenty-three arrests were made over the week-end by the highway patrol in cooperation with the sheriff's department. Nineteen arrests were made Saturday.

Bernice James (colored) charged with possession of non-tax-paid whiskey. Driving drunk charges were brought against Charles Miller and Lloyd Brock, both white, and thirteen colored men mostly from the Wallace and Teachey section. The colored men arrested were John H. Carr, Haywood Bass, David Chambers, Roan Hicks, Billy Gavin, Charlie Wells, Maxie Carroll, William H. Pickett, Tom Everett, Preston Wallace, Jim Williams, Isaac Wells and Washington Costin.

Four arrests were made Sunday. Lila Capps of Goldsboro and Sutton Rhodes of Warsaw were charged with fornication and adultery and placed under a \$500 bond to appear April 23rd County Court. O. L. Griffin (white) of Ayden charged with public drunkenness and Bennett Pickett, (colored) charged with careless and reckless driving.

Tuesday morning James Buddy Lottin was arrested by Chief of Police Combs of Warsaw. The warrant was sworn out by Winnie Penman charging him with assault and attempt to commit rape. Another warrant was sworn out by Chief Combs for public drunkenness and resisting arrest. He is being held in jail under a \$500 bond pending appearance at the August Term of the Superior Court.

Arson Charges Filed In Burning Of House

Burning of mother-in-law's house results in charging Eddie Lee Smith, colored, with the burning of Nettie Shaw's house Saturday night, April 14th, in the Friendship section. He is being held under a \$5,000 bond pending further investigation for appearance at the August term of Superior Court.

In a preliminary hearing, Mack Swinson testified as to seeing Eddie Lee Smith's car drive toward Nettie Shaw's house and return about forty minutes later. In the meantime, the light from the fire was seen and when Eddie Lee Smith passed him on his return he turned the car lights out but Swinson was unable to identify him.

Charges have also been filed by his wife who has been separated from him since Easter for assault with an ax and non-support. Prior to their separation they had lived in the home of Nettie Shaw.

Rev. J. I. Hayter Ordained Sunday

Rev. J. T. "Sam" Hayter was ordained and formerly installed as the pastor of Grove and Hallsville Presbyterian Churches in an impressive ceremony at Grove church here Sunday night.

Calypso Officer Sees Front Line

James E. Stanley, seaman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Stanley of Calypso, was one of ten naval officers and men who acted as front line observers with the Army in Korea from March 19 to March 21, 1951.

Stanley, who is serving aboard the landing ship dock USS Catamount, was taken by truck to Seoul, Korea, and was assigned to a regiment. After reporting to the regiment, he was taken for a tour of the front line, observed artillery in action, and was indoctrinated to the daily Army routine.

Stanley entered the Naval service Dec. 17, 1949, and received his recruit training at the U.S. Naval Training Center, San Diego, Calif.

Beasley Features Court Session; Three Lawyers Admitted

Monday morning was an impressive day for many in Kenansville. Judge Henry L. Stevens swore in three young attorneys to the practice of law in Duplin County and North Carolina. It was an unusual event for Judge Stevens and his son Henry 3rd for father to be administering the oath to his son. Along with young Henry was Norwood Boney, Jr., of Kenansville and Greensboro, son of Mr. and Mrs. N.B. Boney, Sr. of Kenansville and Russell Jarvis Lanier of Beulaville, son of Mrs. Lila K. Lanier and the late Jarvis Lanier.

The three young men stood before Judge Stevens and took their oath simultaneously.

Prior to the actual swearing-in Vance B. Gavin presented Mr. Boney to the Bar in an eloquent style while County Solicitor Grady Mercer, in a more reserved way, presented Mr. Lanier.

Highlighting the entire occasion was Attorney L. A. Beasley, dean of the Duplin County Bar and maternal grandfather of Henry Stevens 3rd, who presented him. Mr. Beasley was in a reminiscing mood that morning and delighted the more than 200 spectators in reviewing the history of the Duplin County Bar since anti-bellum days. Spiced with good humorous remark about some of the old timers he traced the growth and development of the Bar since civil war days to almost the present. Before Mr. Beasley could conclude his talk, which was to include present day Duplin and Kenansville's progress in general, Judge Stevens had to ask him to cut his talk short due to illness of the Judge. Judge Stevens was ill before the ceremonies began.

He was taken to his home in Warsaw and doctors were called and on Tuesday he was carried to Duke Hospital.

About 30 lawyers representing the Bars of Pender, Sampson, Onslow and Lenoir Counties were in attendance.

State To Get 105 Additional Highway Patrolmen

Raleigh, N. C.—The 105 additional State highway patrolmen authorized at the present session of the General Assembly will receive training in the Highway Patrol Training School at the Institute of Government, Chapel Hill, May 7 through June 16. Col. James R. Smith, commanding officer of the Patrol reported today.

This addition will bring the Patrol up to its newly-authorized strength of 538 men.

Qualified men interested in becoming highway patrolmen and in attending the six-week school should submit their applications immediately to Col. Smith. The present starting salary for patrolmen is \$2,500 a year.

The increase in Patrol personnel was authorized by the General Assembly to help meet present traffic problems on North Carolina highways, brought about by increases in motor vehicle registrations, in drivers and in paved road mileage.

Col. Smith stated that candidates must be citizens of the United States and residents of North Carolina for the past five years; be between 21 and 31 years of age and not subject to induction into the armed forces under present selective service regulations; must weigh at least 160 pounds; be at least five feet 10 inches in height; have completed a high school education or the equivalent; be of good moral character and have no criminal record; and have no relative now employed by the Department of Motor Vehicles. Applications should be sent to the State Highway Patrol, Raleigh, N. C.

Boy Scout Camps Ready For Summer Openings June 10, 30

Camp Tuscarora and Camp Carver, the two Boy Scout Camps maintained by Tuscarora Council, have completed plans for their 1951 operation, announced S. M. Davis, Camping and Activities Chairman for the Council. Camp Carver, for Colored Scouts, will open June 10 and results will be reported until June 30. Mr. D. N. Howard will serve as Camp Director of this camp. He will be ably assisted by Mr. William Carl Taylor of Goldsboro.

Camp Tuscarora will open June 17 under the direction of Mr. John Robert ("Cotton") Kluttz. Other adult members of the Camp Staff will be Mr. L. W. Hewitt, Jack Smithwick and Chief Red Fox, a Sioux Indian chief. Around this competent and experienced adult staff an excellent staff of Junior Scouters has been recruited. Eagle Scout Eugene Davis will serve as Waterfront Director. He will be assisted by Eagle Scout Billy Gibson and Rudolph Lucas. Every phase of the Scouting Program will receive expert instruction. There will be canoeing, boating, handcraft instruction, riflery, archery, and athletics.

Perhaps the greatest single attraction at both Camp Tuscarora and Camp Carver this year will be the presence of a real Indian Chief. Chief Red Fox, a chieftain of the Sioux tribe, will conduct classes in leatherwork and Indian Lore. He will also assist with the Campfire Program. Chief Red Fox is the son of Chief Black Eagle who participated in the battle of the Little Big Horn. He is the official historian of the Sioux Nation, and is recognized as one of America's outstanding authorities on Indian Lore. He is a master of handicraft and pioneering skills and has been active in Scout Camps in all sections of America. His presence in camp will add color and zest to an outstanding camping program. Registrations are being made through Scoutmasters for both camps. A record attendance is anticipated.
