Rockfish Run At Weldon

Weldon, N. C.—A spawning run of fish the like of which can be found nowhere else in the world is the rockfish (striped bass) run up the Roanoke river, which reaches its peak near Weldon.

By the thousands, the rockfish suddenly begin driving upriver to their spawning grounds, and the run is on. For four weeks, Weldon is the world's fishing capital—and then, as suddenly as they came, the rock are gone.

The run usually starts about mid-April. When the call goes out that the rock have arrived, fishing fever grips the countryside and almost everyone heads for the river. Many fishermen camp nearby. The chief departure point for fishermen is on the river bank just downriver from the U. S. Highway 301 bridge that spans the Roanoke just northeast of Weldon.

Favorite method of fishing is from boats with huge dip nets. Sometimes there are two fishermen to a boat, which they let drift broadside to the current while holding their nets in the water. It's quite a trick to dip out a big rock, flip it into the boat and resume position before the boat can turn around.

Other anglers troll for rock. Many people come just to look—and eat the tasty fish.

During the run, Weldon is the scene of a fish hatchery operation which is unique. The hatchery, owned by the town, is operated jointly by the North Carolina Department of Conservation and Development, the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission and the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Heavy-laden female fish are stripped of their eggs (for which the fishermen are paid) and hatched. After a few days, the newly hatched fish are released in the Roanoke.
