

Commission Finishes One-Half Of Bond Paving Program

The State Highway Commission has finished exactly one half of Governor Scott's requested \$200,000,000 bond issue program. Highway Chairman Henry W. Jordan announced a few days ago.

The half-point was passed simultaneously with the end of two years of service by eleven Scott-appointed highway commissioners who went into office on May 1, 1954. They inaugurated the second-year road program immediately after a special referendum the following month.

Reports from the highway divisions made public showed that 10,000 miles of farm-to-market roads have been hard-surfaced and another 9,825 miles stabilized for all-weather travel during the last two years. The mid-state Sixth Highway Division, under the direction of Chairman George S. Coble, led all other sections of the state in miles road paved. The Sixth reported 1,000 miles hard-surfaced through March 31, 1951.

Class behind the leader in total mileage finished were the Seventh Division centering on Charlotte-Salisbury-Wadesboro and the Third encompassing the Fayetteville-Wilmington area. (Duplin is in the Third Division 9,811.7 miles of hard surface and 457.8 miles of stabilized road have been completed.)

At least five counties — Hoke, Robeson, Scotland, Montgomery, and Richmond — have passed their projected paving goals during the two-year period, the reports revealed. This means these counties and others will exceed the mileage promised them when the program began.

Construction work in some sections of the state has moved faster than in others due to administrative and operational policies, weather conditions and terrain. Eventually, each county will get its pro rata share of the bond money authorized as the program moves to a conclusion during the next two years.

As of April 1, 1951 the Commission had expended \$83,241,000 of the \$200,000,000 in bonds issued and allocated another \$29,862,000 to specific projects. Additional bonds will be sold during the early summer.

Mrs. Thelma Taylor Named Welfare Officer In Duplin

Mrs. Thelma D. Taylor has been elected as the Superintendent of the County Welfare Department.

Mrs. Taylor was born in Duplin county and is the daughter of Mrs. Myrtle Dall and the late Henry V. Dall of Calypso.

She is a graduate of Appalachian State Teachers College and did graduate work at the University of North Carolina in social work. She taught school in North Carolina for about twenty years. She has been in public welfare since 1946, first as a case worker and child welfare case worker in Fayetteville. She next went to Warrington, the Warren County seat as the Superintendent of the Warren County welfare Department. Mrs. Taylor came to Kenansville on May 1.

Her husband is a contractor in sheet metal work. He hopes to work in a shop in Warsaw before long, and they plan to move in an apartment belonging to Willie Fussell in Warsaw.

Mrs. Taylor's plans for the welfare program are to give the people of Duplin county a better understanding of the welfare department and the services it gives other than public assistance.

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Miss Clontz Home Dem. Club Agent Resigns

Miss Hilda Clontz, Duplin County Home Demonstration Agent, has made public her resignation to accept the same position in Robeson County, June 1st. The board has accepted her resignation.

Miss Alta Lawson of Orrum has been elected by the board members as the new Home Demonstration Agent. She has been assistant agent for the past four years.

Miss Clontz came to Duplin County eight years ago from Aberdeen where she was a vocational home economics teacher.

She has done exceedingly well in her work and will be missed by her many friends she has made in the county. In 1944 there were 275 club women in Duplin county, and today there are 750. Since Miss Clontz came here nine new clubs have been organized.

Miss Clontz is the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. R. C. Clontz of Hickory. She is a graduate of Queens-Chicora College in Charlotte.

About the Rev. Duncan, Williams had this to say: "The church really grew under his preaching. There are more than 425 members on the church rolls at the last count. There are 232 enrolled in Sunday school. Many great church leaders have gone out from that church as laymen. D. L. Brock is the present Sunday school superintendent."

By the church there is a beautiful graveyard, well landscaped. In the cemetery a roll call would give names Stroude, Walkers, Brooks, Lanes, Kornegays, Swinsons, Jernigans, Olivers, Dixons, Carrs, and others.

One of the Sunday school classes is named after Mrs. Annie Stephens, the wife of one of the pastors. Her picture hangs in the room. Feed sack curtains adorn every room in the building.

Thursday evening, May 10, 1951, at 8:00 o'clock, which meeting had been called by the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners and Ex-officio Chairman of the County Board of Health.

Members present: L. P. Wells, Chairman; O. P. Johnson, Superintendent of schools; A. Q. Brinson, Mayor; B. C. Sheffield, and John Rhodes.

Members absent: Dr. C. P. Hawes and Dr. C. V. Zibelin.

In the absence of Dr. G. V. Gooding, Ex-Officio Secretary, of the County Board of Health, F. W. McGowen was named acting secretary for this meeting.

The chairman stated that the purpose of the meeting was to consider the resignation of Dr. G. V. Gooding, County Health Officer, and irregularities in travel vouchers in the County Health Department.

The minutes of the Board of County Commissioners at a regular meeting on May 7, 1951, concerning the investigation by the Board of Commissioners into these irregularities were read. Also, the transcript of the evidence at the hearing before the Board of County Commissioners on May 7, 1951, was read.
