ing that one a pig. In those days razor blades were all we had in the next door on the adjoining farm. In some places the meaning of neighborhood is retained and its implications practiced. Duplin County gave a demonstration of this fact Monday night when a thousand or so residents of the county and several dozen outside friends gathered around an old-fashioned picnic table at the spring near the courthouse in Kenansville, and later were joined by another thousand to hear Governor Scott speak and participate in a square dance on the broad village street in front of the courthouse.

The Governor's speech has been pretty widely publicized, but it was essentially the same speech he has made many times before. The setting was distinctive.

UNITY — The word neighborhood implies commonly and the whole Kenansville affair implied unity of purpose. It was sponsored by the newly formed Duplin Industrial Council which has the objective of promoting agriculture, industrial and social development of the county. Governor Scott was invited to represent the State's participation in that development through the building of better roads and school houses and aid extended through the Department of Agriculture and the Division of Commerce and Industry. The people of the county turned out in grand style to celebrate achievements and renew pledges for continued efforts toward great development. It was not a political rally, a fact emphasized by notable absence of State Senator Rivers Johnson and Representative Bob Carr as well as other well known public figures of the section. Businessmen representing chambers of commerce and civic clubs were prominent among the visitors, including the brass of the Wilmington chamber. The whole idea was unity of purpose and objective, not only for Duplin County but for the entire southeastern area of the state.

PROGRESS — The leaders directed attention mainly to the future and the need for further effort, but they were able to report substantial progress. In addition to huge installations at Wilmington, Acme, Wallace, Kinston and other points, it was noted that numerous small industries have been established during the past few years. Du Pont, Reigel Pulp and Stevens Textiles accounted for the multi-million dollar enterprises, but there was equal — or greater — pride in the numerous locally sponsored establishments adding to regional payrolls. The picnic table testified to the excellence of the agriculture and culinary statue of Duplin. Statistics probably could be obtained as to how many hams and chickens, how many dozens of eggs, how many cakes and pies, how many pounds of barbecue, what quantity of pickles and condiments, were on that table. It doesn't matter; there was enough for everybody with a lot to take home.

DEMOGRAPHY — Someone suggested it would be a good idea to send a picture of the picnickers and the square dancers, with accompanying sound recording, to Joe Stalin and his folks. It was a demonstration of real democracy. On the speaker's stand Governor Scott was accorded honors befitting the chief executive of the state.

statement later in the evening that if anybody left hungry it was his own fault. Such gatherings are not unique in North Carolina and in their atmosphere of competitive cooperation may be found the strong roots of genuine democracy as believed and practiced by Americans. What is causing your tomatoes to rot on the blossom end of the small green fruits? A good question, and one this is easily answered. The trouble is known as blossom-end rot and is not caused by a disease organism but by dry weather and lack of moisture. I have seen as much as 50 per cent of a crop lost because of it. Prevent blossom-end rot by timely irrigation and mulching—but do it before you lose your crop.

Have you planted your collard seed yet? It is time now to plant collard, cabbage, broccoli and Chinese cabbage seed for fall crop. In the Piedmont and Coastal Plain areas there is still time to set Tomatoe plants for a late crop. The early crop usually does not last until October. Plantings of snapbeans, butterbeans and sweet corn can also be made now, since we have had a little rain.

About this time of the year a few gardeners like to plant late Irish potatoes, using small potatoes to sprout, since their rest period has not been broken. Sometimes they may be induced to sprout by spreading them out in the shade and letting them green up. Another way is to break the rest-period by treating the seed with a chemical Ethylene Chlorhydrin. This treatment is not successful if the weather is very hot. Ethylene Chlorhydrin may be obtained from some of the large seed firms in the South, and your county agent should be able to get you information concerning its use.
