GARDEN TIME

Many vegetables are still growing in the gardens of the state and for that reason we don't begin to think of cover crops until too late for some of the better ones. There is no good reason at all why cover crops should not be planted among garden crops at the last cultivation which is right at hand in some parts of the state.

Three of the more commonly us ed cover crops are rye, Italian rye grass and crimson clover. My personal objection to rye and rye grass are that in small gardens they are very difficult to turn under so that they will not come up again and require killing with a hoe. However, they do have the advantage of making good early growth in the spring.

My choice is crimson clover be-cause of its ease of handling and because it is a legume. One ob-jection to it is that it doesn't make heavy growth in spring as early as rye. However, the part of the gar-den to be used for early crops could be plowed after the clover is large. Crimson clover should be planted in early September and will require about 20 pounds of seed per acre. If you have not grown clover before you may have to inoculate at planting time. The large seed stores sell clover ino-culants. If your soil is very acid an application of lime would help

As I have intimated earlier in this column, I grow dahlias as a hobby. Even with such a large growing crop I make a practice of sowing crimson clover among the dahlia plants about the first or second week in September each year.

I have been plased with th rsults


