Home Mobilization Committee has recently completed a summation of the results of a State-wide survey seeking to determine from the farm family itself their rural needs. Over 600 meetings were held and many needs were enumerated, but throughout the state in practically every county, rural people expressed the desire for an expanded rural telephone program. The demand for telephone service is indicated by a recent statement of Governor W. Kerr Scott that "of all the many and varied requests for assistance coming to the Governor's office, requests for assistance in securing rural telephone service and expressions of appreciation for assistance rendered head the list."

The North Carolina Rural Electrification Authority of which Gwyn B. Price is Chairman is authorized to assist rural groups in securing electric service. Fuller says that the North Carolina Rural Electrification Authority has a ten-point program and that tremendous progress towards state-wide rural telephone service may be had through this program as follows:

1. Recognition by all of state-wide need for rural telephone service and its potential contribution to better rural living and community and state development.
2. Encouraging existing companies to recognize their privilege franchise and manifest sincere effort to provide area service.
3. Assumption of responsibility by rural home owners to subscribe to telephone service in order that efficient, adequate and profitable service may be provided.
4. Maximum use of latest telephone service Research and encouragement of continued and expanded research looking toward efficient rural communication through radio, wireless, use of power lines or other efficient means.
5. County and community surveys with plotted maps giving names and addresses and showing where and how much service is needed.
6. Support and action programs of Farm Bureau, Grange, home demonstration groups, PTA, civic groups, electric membership corporations, Rural Electrification Administration, and county officials in securing rural telephone service.
7. Close coordination between the North Carolina Rural Electrification Authority and North Carolina Utilities Commission in developing an efficient rural telephone program.
8. Rural telephone service through mutuals and private lines.
9. Rural telephone service through existing telephone companies.
10. Rural telephone service through subscriber owned and operated cooperatives.

Names First Place

RALEIGH — The North Carolina Motor Carriers Association was named as the first place winner in the 1951 National Truck Safety contest by the American Trucking Association, Inc., of Washington.

The announcement letter was received by J. T. Outlaw, NCMCA, Executive Secretary from John V. Lawrence, ATA Managing Director. In his letter Mr. Lawrence said, crop is forecast by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics at 56.2 million boxes, 4 per cent larger than last season and 21 per cent above average. Grapefruit is below average for the country as a whole, but in Florida, which supplies many southeastern markets the crop may be record size.

Honey production at 240 million pounds, is 7 per cent larger than the previous record, and ample supplies of table honey will be marketed throughout the Southeast. Pecan production, at 147,905,000 pounds, is an estimated 18 per cent larger than the 1950 crop, and 19 per cent above average.
