Science Comes To The Rescue

IN A column we described the symptoms of several common types of worms which infest most dogs at one time or another. Among those discussed were roundworms, hookworms, tapeworms, and whipworms.

One common variety of worms—heartworms—was omitted in the column because it required more extensive discussion than space permitted. Heartworms are perhaps the most deadly of all, and likely they are hardest for the owner to detect before they have seriously impaired his dog's health.

Heartworms are thought to be transmitted chiefly through the sting of mosquitoes and by ticks. The insect introduces the worm larvae into a dog's bloodstream. Eventually the larvae develop into worms which make their way to the heart, where they may grow up to eight inches in length. Here they live and produce new larvae which are spawned into the blood.

Heartworm infestation was once thought to be confined largely to the South, where it is estimated that 75 percent of the dogs may be suffering from it. In recent years the infestation has spread widely, and there is evidence that it is still increasing.

The chief symptoms of heartworms are loss of weight, listlessness, sometimes convulsions, gasping for breath, and coughing. Occasionally, these symptoms are accompanied by swelling of the legs.

Within the past couple of years, veterinarians have had an important new ally in their fight against this scourge. This is a product called Caricide, which was marketed specifically for veterinarians' use by the Lederle Laboratories, of Pearl River, N. Y., in 1949.

"Caricide" is another name for a Lederle product called Hetrazan, which was developed by Lederle researchers in 1948 as a treatment for the dreaded human disease, filariasis, or "Big Foot," which was common in Africa, India, and South Pacific areas.

Caricide is the only known oral treatment for heartworms, and it also knocks out roundworms, the most common of the parasites.

APPLE KUCHEN

Apples can serve as the basis for any number of delicious desserts. This new recipe for a spicy dish called apple kuchen is worthy of adding to your collection. Give your family a fair warning to save room for dessert when you serve apple kuchen, because it is unusually rich.



Apple Kuchen

1 cup milk, scalded
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup margarine
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup lukewarm water
 2 packages or cakes yeast
 2 eggs
 4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 3 apples, sliced
 1/2 cup sugar
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1 egg yolk
 2 tablespoons cream or top milk

Mix the sugar, margarine, and salt in the hot milk. Cool to a lukewarm temperature. Dissolve the yeast in the lukewarm water. Follow directions on package for dry yeast.) Combine the milk and yeast mixture and stir in the well-beaten eggs. Add and stir in the flour using enough to make a stiff batter. This recipe will make two 8-inch square pans. Four into greased pans. Cover with a clean towel. Place in a warm place and let rise until doubled in bulk. Arrange the peeled sliced apples over the top. Sprinkle over the apples. Mix the egg yolk and cream together and drizzle around the apples. Bake in a moderately hot oven (350° F.) for 30 to 35 minutes.
