Heartworms are thought to be transmitted chiefly through the sting of mosquitos and by ticks. The insect introduces the worm larvae—into a dog's bloodstream. Eventually the larvae develop into worms which make their way to the heart, where they may grow up to eight inches in length. Here they live and produce new larvae which are spawned into the blood.
