## Du Pont Announces New Chemical To Control Tomato And Spud Disease

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Dec. 11 — A new chemical protector against plant diseases which every year cause farm-crop damage running well into the millions was disclosed here tonight by the Du Pont Company during a session of the national meeting of the American Phytopathological society.

This important addition to vital farm chemicals will be available in limited quantities in 1952 as "Manzate" fungicide. Chemically it is manganese ethylene bisdithiocarbamate, the sixth in a series of organic plant protectant materials, based on derivatives of dithiocarbamic acid developed by Du Pont agricultural research.

Pending final review by government authorities, "Manzate" is expected to be recommended specifically to control anthracnose, gray leaf spot and Septoria leaf spots on tomatoes, and early and late blights on both tomatoes and potatoes — all major fungous infections which annually take a heavy toll of these crops.

The new fungicide has undergone extensive field testing, for several years, both by Du Pont investigators and federal and state experiment stations. During the past season more than 100 investigators in 32 states, Hawaii, Canada, and Mexico have evaluated the compound for disease control with such crops as tomatoes, potatoes, apples, cereal grains, cucumbers, squash, melons, celery, tobacco, ornamentals, and a variety of other vegetables, fruit and nut crops.

While Du Pont's recommendations for use of "Manzate" will be confined to applications on tomatoes and potatoes at the present time, further tests to control diseases on other crops will con-

inue through 1952, according to Dr. B. L. Richards, Jr., Du Pont plant pathologist who reported on the new material.

As a chemical to control tomato diseases, "Manzate" fungicide offers a single treatment which is effective against all major fungous enemies, both fruit and foliage, of the tomato plant. Previously two or more chemicals have been required in alternate applications to control the various diseases. This ability to rely on one material relieves the tomato grower of a critical problem in timing his sprays to effectively apply the right chemical at the right time to combat each disease.

As a potato fungicide, "Manzate" has proven particularly effective in cases where both early and late blights were equally severe at the same time.

## Wildlife Candidate School Announced

The North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission and the Institute of Government of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill will conduct a training school for prospective wildlife protectors starting in January, 1952. Clyde P. Patton, Executive Director of the Wildlife Resources Commission, announced today.

Men between the ages of 21 and 45 who are interested in becoming wildlife protectors may apply for the training school or from the Wildlife Resources Commission, Raleigh. Applications must be completed and on file in the Commission's Raleigh office by January

1952. Applicants for positions will be given a competitive examination later in January and successful applicants will be given a thorough training course at the Institute of Government training school in Chapel Hill. Room and board will be provided and a small salary will be paid trainees during the course. Candidates completing the training course successfully will be installed as wildlife protectors immediately or held in reserve until vacancies occur.


Starting salary for wildlife protectors will be \$2,500.00 per year, plus \$540.00 expenses, with provisions for periodic increases in salary and expense allowances. In addition to being between 21 and 45 years of age, applicants should have at least a high school education, be interested in wildlife conservation, and meet high mental and moral standards.
