Name Four North Carolina Club Members

TOP RANKING records in the 1951 National 4-H Food Preparation, Public Speaking and Health programs have brought club members to four North Carolina club members. Their awards and brief outlines of records follow.

Detor L. Hamrick, 17, of Shelby, and Martha Cashion, 18, of Cornelius, do not understand the necessity for being well-informed and ideas fluently and interestingly. Because of its interest in rural youth, the Pure Oil Co. provides merit awards as encouragement to the young people in this program. Martha received a set of beautiful silverware, while Ector was presented with a 17-jewel gold watch.

Ector's winning speech was entitled "The 4-H's of Club Work." He talked of the new responsibilities that youth is asked to assume in shaping the policies of the new world order. "In the days ahead the destiny of our land will be in the hands of the trained youth of today," Ector stressed the value of the 4-H Club program in teaching its members to think, plan and reason. Through it they are being prepared to assume their responsibilities of the future.

In her talk on "What 4-H Club Work Has Done for Me, My Home and My Community" Martha declared that being a 4-H member has enabled her to become a more active participant in her home and has brought her family closer together. She especially emphasized the part 4-H has enabled youth to play in building better rural communities. Regarding the winning of the award, she says, "In club work it isn't the reward. It's learning to be a good winner and a good loser."

The result has been improved eating habits for herself and family, as well as a considerable saving in food bills. A 4-H'er for six years, Shirley has completed 25 projects and received numerous awards. At the Waugh house Shirley is chief cook and she likes it. During the past year she prepared 3,000 dishes, 150 meals and assisted with more than 1,000 additional meals. A versatile young housemaker, she has received many ribbons and prizes in clothing, public speaking, recreation and rural arts, and dairy foods demonstration. Shirley's trip award to National Club Congress in Chicago was presented by Kelvinator.

Acclaimed 4-H Health Improvement winner in North Carolina for 1951, Max Ballinger, 18, Guilford College, received an educational trip to 4-H Congress in Chicago as guest of the Kellogg Co. of Battle Creek. Untiring efforts to improve his own health and the health habits of family and community, earned for Max this recognition. He believes that good health is the reward of a conscientious program aiming at physical and mental health. This is the second recognition for outstanding health achievement for Max who was this year's State Health Improvement King. Refinements Featured In 1952 Chryslers

Refinements throughout the line rather than revolutionary engineering innovations, characterizes Chrysler's 1952 models, which will be on display in dealers' showrooms throughout the country Dec. 14. There are two fundamental reasons why changes are less sweeping than generally is the case with the introduction of a new Chrysler line. It is explained by Joseph A. O'Malley, general sales manager of Chrysler Division, Chrysler Corporation.

"The demands of the rearmament program have created a situation in the machine tool industry that would preclude the extensive tooling program entailed by drastic model changes," says Mr. O'Malley. "Furthermore, Chrysler introduced more important new features in its 1951 line than ever before were offered by any manufacturer in a single year. These included the 180-horsepower V-8 FirePower engine, Hydralgide power steering, Oriflow shock absorbers and Fluid-Torque drive torque converter.

"The tremendous public reception of the 1951 cars, plus the shortage of materials, prevented our coming anywhere near filling the demand for them this year and we carry into 1952 a bank of orders that will be augmented by the improvements in our new line. We believe that our current vehicles are far ahead of the times."

The refinements available in the 1952 cars are contributors to performance, appearance, safety, economy and comfort. Certain features heretofore available only in certain models have been extended to cover the entire line. Dimensionally, all body styles are the same as corresponding models of the 1951 line.

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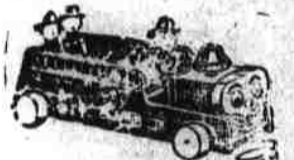


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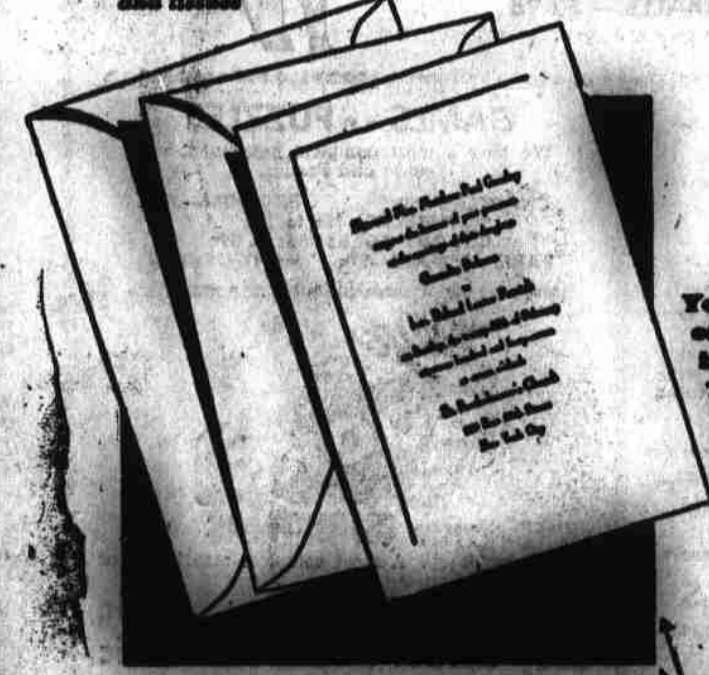


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
