Market Roundup

Raleigh, N. C., By the Division of Markets, N. C. Department of Agriculture, in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Hog prices were 25 cents per hundred pounds lower at Carolina's Cash Hog Buying Stations during the week ending February 3. Good and choice barrows and gilts ranged from 17.75 to 18.00 with most markets topping at 17.75. Hogs closed 35 cents lower in Richmond and Baltimore to top at 18.00 and 18.50 respectively. Chicago closed steady to 10 cents lower with a top of 19.75.

Cattle prices were steady to stronger for light to moderate receipts at Rocky Mount and Rich-

Square livestock auction markets. Cows auctioned from 14.50 to 22.75; heifers from 17.50 to 40.50; calves from 24.00 to 45.00; steers from 23.00 to 32.25; and bulls from 24.00 to 28.75. In Chicago, slaughter steers and heifers were steady to 50 cents higher and cows and bulls 50 cents to mostly 1.00 higher. Stockers and feeders were steady to strong while vealers were 2.00 to 3.00 lower.

In Chicago's wholesale dressed meat market, steer and heifer beef was steady to 50 cents lower with instances 1.00 lower. Cow beef was barely steady and lamb was 1.00 to 2.00 lower. Veal closed fully steady, mutton firm, and pork cuts steady.

Fryers and broilers were mostly steady to one cent higher at Central

North Carolina points with farm pay prices at 30 cents per pound. Heavy hens were mostly steady to one cent weaker at 26 to 27 cents for the farm. Fryers were generally steady at other leading southern producing areas. Closing farm pay prices ranged from 29 1-2 to 31 cents in the North Georgia section, from 29 1-4 to 33 cents in the Delmarva area, and from 29 to 30 cents in the Shenandoah Valley area.

Egg prices were steady in Raleigh. Local grading stations paid 43 cents per dozen for A, large; 40 for A, medium; 38 for B, large; and 33 to 35 for current collections.

In New York, sweet potatoes closed firm with bushels of U. S. No. 1 Porto Ricans from North Carolina wholesaling from 6.00 to 6.50 with most sales at 6.25 to 6.50. Strawberries were steady to firm with Florida Missionaries reported from 32 to 33 cents per pint and a few as high as 35.

Corn prices continued to show a weaker tendency at Eastern North Carolina markets with decreases up to 1.70 to 1.80 per bushel; however, most markets reported a range from 1.70 to 1.75. In the Piedmont section, No. 1 yellow ranged from 1.85 to 1.90 per bushel. Number 2 white corn also declined in the eastern section to range from 1.56 to 1.75 per bushel. In the Piedmont area, number 2 white is reported from 1.75 to 1.90 per bushel. Soybean prices were steady at eastern markets to range from 2.50 to 2.65 per bushel for Number 2 yellow. Wheat declined ten cents per bushel in Albemarle and number 2 red

Tungsten Growing

Tungsten, N. C.—Every hour of every day, one or more crews are working here to help Uncle Sam stockpile the mineral—indispensable in the atomic age—which gave this town its name.

Already the second-largest producer of tungsten in the United States, the Tungsten Mining Corporation is now building new facilities to double production before 1952 runs out.

The company is currently working two shifts six days a week in this Vance County mine 18 miles northwest of Henderson. It is bringing up 400 tons of ore a day. The crushing mill, where three shifts are on the job seven days a week, processes about 325 tons a day. The rest is stockpiled.

By July, when the new crushing mill under construction around the old one is scheduled to begin operation, the plant will be able to refine over 600 tons of ore a day. About October, new steel headframes, hoists, ore-dins, and skips (buckets which bring up the ore) at the two working shafts will be lifting larger quantities of tungsten-bearing rock to feed the growing appetite of the mill.

The new mill will also recover a higher portion of tungsten minerals from the ore.

Just to look at it the town of Tungsten, North Carolina, isn't impressive. The headframes at the two shafts, 4,000 feet apart, the crushing mill strung along a hillside, and a few small buildings—including one which houses the post office and a grocery store—make up the town. A total of 345 persons, including staff members work here.

But Tungsten, on a long ridge in this slightly rolling land near where the North Carolina Piedmont blends into the Coastal Plain, is a big spot on the map of the National Munitions Board.

Again, as in World War II when working of the deposit here was started after foreign sources of tungsten were pinched off, vital tungsten from Vance County is pouring into America's increasing preparedness effort. In slightly more than nine years of production, Tungsten Mining has produced concentrates containing more than 4,500,000 pounds of pure tungsten. Actually, tungsten is not found in the pure form in nature, but in combination with other elements. The most abundant of these tungsten-bearing minerals, known as concentrates, in the mine here are huerberite, with a usable tung-

4,000 Charged With Speeding

Raleigh — Nearly 4,000 North Carolina motorists faced court action for speeding last month the Department of Motor Vehicles reported today. In its first monthly summary of traffic violations for the new year the Department reported 3,851 speeding convictions; 2,206 convictions for reckless driving and 1,538 for driving without an operator's permit.

For failing to stop for a stop sign or red light 644 motorists were convicted; 305 answered charges for driving with improper lights; 228 were caught and convicted for passing on hills and curves; and 112 were convicted for failing to give a hand signal.

Falling to give right - of - way brought 104 convictions. Miscellaneous violations carried the month's total to 10,211.

Out of state drivers accounted for another 1,335 convictions, bringing the grand total to 11,586 persons found guilty of traffic violations on the streets and highways of one state during January.
