Although there is some variation in the requirements of different shrubs it is usually safe to apply 3 to 4 pounds of a 6-8-6 or 5-10-5 mixed fertilizer per 100 sq. ft. of bed space or from 1-2 pound to 1 pound around each shrub where planted

Therefore the fertilizer should be applied in this zone and not near the trunk. Apply 1 to 2 pounds of a 6-8-6 mixture the first year and about 4 pounds per inch of diamet-er of the trunk of the tree each year thereafter. 


