North Carolina Needs 4-H Garden And Home Improvement Programs

With Spring busting out all over throughout the South, North Carolina has renewed two 4-H programs which are important factors in the development of wholesome family relationships and purposeful, healthful living, the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work has announced. They are the Garden and Home Improvement awards programs, designed for both boys and girls.
 In 1951 more than 350,000 club members raised 120,000 acres of garden vegetables and small fruits according to State Club leaders, thereby providing essential and nutritious foods for use throughout the year, and increasing individual and family incomes by reducing the amount of food purchased. About 200,000 members taking part in the 4-H Home Improvement program performed 550,000 tasks, such as making slipcovers and curtains, upholstering and refinishing furniture, and painting or papering rooms to make their homes more comfortable and attractive.
 Incentives for outstanding records of achievement in both programs remain the same as last year. Every club member taking part in either program has the opportunity to win one of four county medals of honor. Also a state award of an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next November, and a chance to become a candidate for one of the eight national awards—a \$300 college scholarship. All-Chalmers provides the Garden program awards, and the Sears-Roebuck Foundation those for Home Improvement.
 Last year, 230 4-Hers in 83 of this State's counties received medals for their Garden records, and 149 members in 82 counties won similar recognition for home improvement achievements.
 All 4-H programs are supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service.

For most trees and shrubs the best time to apply fertilizer is at the time the buds begin to swell or when spring is just around the corner. At this time the plants are beginning active root growth and leaf development and are able to make use of the soluble salts in the fertilizers. An exception to this rule would be azaleas which should be fertilized as soon as they are through blooming.
 Although there is some variation in the requirements of different shrubs it is usually safe to apply 3 to 4 pounds of a 6-8-6 or 5-10-5 mixed fertilizer per 100 sq. ft. of bed space or from 1-2 pound to 1 pound around each shrub where planted separately according to the size of the shrub. A 6-8-4 fertilizer means that it contains 6 per cent of available nitrogen, 8 per cent of available phosphoric acid and 6 per cent of available potash. The fertilizer should be thoroughly raked into the soil under the shrubs and watered in if the soil is dry. For azaleas, camellias and their acid-loving plants there are special acid-reacting fertilizers, or a mixture containing one-third sulphate of ammonia and two-thirds cottonseed meal may be used.
 Shade trees and fruit trees require a little different treatment than shrubs. The feed roots or trees are not close to the trunk but extend out to a zone under and just beyond the tips of the branches. Therefore the fertilizer should be applied in this zone and not near the trunk. Apply 1 to 2 pounds of a 6-8-6 mixture the first year and about 4 pounds per inch of diameter of the trunk of the tree each year thereafter. If the land is cultivated the fertilizer may be cultivated in. Otherwise it should be applied in holes made with a crowbar or soil auger.
 For grape vines apply one-half
