Whatever advantages Paul had had at birth or by education, he had definitely lost long before the end

YET Paul, in writing up the balance sheet of his life, calls everything he had lost so much trash, in comparison with what he had gained. To his mind it was like losing a truck-load of ashes and finding one diamond.

We curselves, not being, alast saints, if we had fixed up his halance sheet, would have put some items on the credit side that he does not mention. After all, he was then and still is Christendom's first clitren.

For many of us, and all of us call him Saint, which means he belongs to God's aristocracy. You can afford to lose a good deal for that; He was also, and still is, close to the top, if not at the top, of the list of the mont influential men in the world's history, aside from Christ himself. He is this, because almost half the books in the New Testament were written by him. Yet he does not say, speaking of his life's hardships, "I count these things as nothing in comparison with my position as leader . . the fact of my sainthood . . . my contribution to the Eible."
