More years ago than I like to remember, I attended the College of William and Mary at Williamsburg, Virginia. I was too young for college and did not derive as much benefit as I should have from it. But we did have a few good teachers, born teachers, who could inspire their students with their zeal for learning and encouraged intellectual curiosity—there are not many teachers like that anywhere. Little did we know what awaited us.

In return for use of the theatre, the director had promised the officials of the institution that we would give a full dress performance for the inmates of the asylum—and had told us nothing of the ordeal that awaited us. He wanted to test our abilities as for our first production. At that
