First Aid Kits Needed On Farms

Modern farm equipment includes inexpensive first aid kits, strategically located where they may save a life or prevent serious infections from injury, points out Lucy Weeks, county farm agent for State College Extension Service. With the coming of the busy season on the farm says the agent, such equipment is especially important. It should be available both in the house and at convenient points about the farmstead and on farm equipment.

First Aid Kits Needed On Farms

It is a simple matter to provide satisfactory home-made first aid kits at low cost. The National Safety Council says a tight box, preferably metal, such as a cash box or fishing tackle box or even a tightly covered tin can will serve as a container. The container should be thoroughly cleaned and well labeled and packed with the following materials: rolls of adhesive tape of varying widths, sterile cotton swabs, hand sticks, sterile white cloth for large bandages and tourniquets, a tube of sterile white vaseline for minor burns, scissors, boric acid, tincture of benzoin, an approved antiseptic, and aromatic spirits of ammonia.

Fun and profit BACKLOT FARMING



If Tastes Better When You Raise It Yourself

There's a lot of fun raising your own meat, poultry and eggs in your own backyard, especially when you have youngsters "looking for something to do when school's out." Besides providing an outlet for all this excess energy, the backlot farm affords children a first hand training in helping provide for the family and it plays no small part in stretching the family food budget. In addition, the relatively small effort required enables the average working man to add a few live-stock or poultry projects to his annual vegetable garden to supply the family table.

A backlot farm doesn't require "acres." A small space can be adapted to fill the average family's needs when careful advance planning and sound management are considered. A backlot farmer, who raises vegetables, usually plots his garden well in advance of "spring planting" and it is at this stage that he can work out his program to include some chickens, possibly a pig or two, and maybe even a milking cow. The family cow is a wise investment; aside from a relatively small patch for grazing, can be kept in tip-top condition and in profitable production by using proven feeding practices and management methods. A small flock of chickens doesn't take up too much room and the fresh eggs and poultry meat will more than make up for the time and effort demanded by the chickens. White Pekin ducks can be a backlot farm project, since this breed is adaptable to small scale operations as well as large commercial enterprises. The family leader can be further expanded when the backlot farm includes a hutch or two of rabbits, and a brace of pigeons can provide squabs, a real treat for the family. Backlot farming is gaining in popularity all over the country and every spring and summer more and more families raising their own vegetables and adding meat, poultry and eggs to the family table.
