Whiteville Tobacco Market Getting All Set For Opening On August 4th

Whiteville's most prized possession of economy, its tobacco market, opens wide the doors of welcome on Monday, August 4, to begin another season of service to the growers of Eastern North Carolina.

The Whiteville market which led the North Carolina Border Belt markets in average price per pound (\$33.83) during the 1931 season, is anticipating one of its greatest years in pondage and money paid out. Reaching the forty million mark during the past season local observers predict that the market will sell nearly 45,000,000 pounds this season to break all previous records.

Eight firms will operate the 15 giant warehouses on the Whiteville market this season with no changes in management or personnel. All warehousemen on this leading market have had years of experience in the tobacco selling industry and are known throughout the flue-cured selling world as the best in the business.

The warehouses and their operators are: Moore's Warehouse, A. H. Bert Moore and Charlie Mason, Eggle's, Farmer's and Columbus County with Mr. Jack Neal and A. Dial Gray, Perkins-Newman No. 1 and 2 with Bill and Harold Perkins and Norwood Newman, Leas No. 1 and 2 with Louie Love and Townes Lea, Planters No. 1 and 2 with J. W. Buck Peay and A. O. King, Nelson's No. 1 and 2 with John and M. O. Nelson, Crutchfield's with Raymond and Gattier Crutchfield, and Modley's and Brooks with Blair and Latane Modley. Farmers from all over Eastern North Carolina have been selling with these veteran warehousemen and have helped in making the Whiteville market the leader in the Border Belt.

To give an example of why it is the big money market, during the season just past, it can be noted that the Whiteville market was paying out a total of \$101,605,386 per hour during the 44 selling days. The market sold over a million pounds per day during an 18 day stretch last season to lead all markets in all belts during that period.

During the past six years it is almost unbelievable, but true, that the Whiteville Market has paid out to the growers of the golden weed over \$100,000,000 (one hundred million, that is) for an average of \$16,500,000 per year. During the same period, over 190,000,000 pounds of tobacco have been auctioned off, which would keep the entire City of Whiteville in cigarettes for a life-time.

The market will open a five hours a day selling schedule, which means that with Whiteville's three sets of buyers, the local market will have a total of 15 hours selling time daily. Six thousand baskets a day will be sold for the top dollar in the 15 warehouses that could easily hit the million pounds per day figure.

Competition should be the greatest among buying companies since 1946 as the anticipated 12 1-2 per

cent cut in allotments for the 1932 season and a somewhat hard hit crop in certain areas should make the demand very strong. With a tentative top of \$74.00 on best grades, farmers can look for the Whiteville market to record a much higher average than was made last year when it led the North Carolina Border Markets.

The Whiteville Market has grown from a one-sale, 10 million pounds per year market, to one of the finest three sale markets in the entire flue-cured tobacco selling region. This amazing growth promises to be a continual operation as with each new season, Whiteville breaks old records and up the ladder as the Border Belt's Finest Tobacco Market.

The man who made the Whiteville market — the farmer — is the most important man in our town.
