Mount Olive Host To East Carolina Firemen Calypso Department Admitted To Association

Olive Tribune) Members of Mount Olive's volunteer fire department were hosts to about 135 firemen from 32 other towns in eastern North Carolina when the regular quarterly meeting of the Eastern Carolina Firemen's association was held in Mount Olive Tuesday, July 8. Wiley Rogers, of Robersonville, N. C., presided over the meeting, after the address of welcome by Mayor Nelson Ricks. Other officers of the group are M. E. Warren, of Plymouth, vice-president; E. W. Kinley, of Grange, secretary-treasurer. Waldo C. Cheek, insurance commissioner for the state of North Carolina, was the principal speaker, and told those present his office is now working on plans to reduce fire rates.

Other dignitaries present for the meeting were Curtis Flannagan of Farmville, president of the North Carolina Firemen's Association; Julie Grey, chief of the Kinston department, who is also head of district three of the N. C. Fire Chiefs association; and Elmer Jones, Raleigh, of the insurance commissioner's office. During the business session of the meeting the newly organized Calypso Volunteer Fire department was accepted into the eastern association, and President Flannagan, of the state group, extended an invitation to the new department to become affiliated with the state association. There are 22 members of the Calypso department with Hiram Cook as chief. Following the business members of the local department presented a birthday cake to Former Assistant Chief L. J. Simmons in honor of his 64th birthday, which was on Tuesday. The cake was a complete surprise to Mr. Simmons, as was the cake presented to Former Chief George E. Summerlin, whose 70th birthday was on Wednesday, the day following the meeting. Mr. and Mrs. Ralph English, of Mount Olive then presented a birthday cake to the local department, appropriately decorated with the words "1894-1952". Ladies of the Methodist church served the firemen a fried chicken supper in the lunatory school lunchroom, where the meeting was held. 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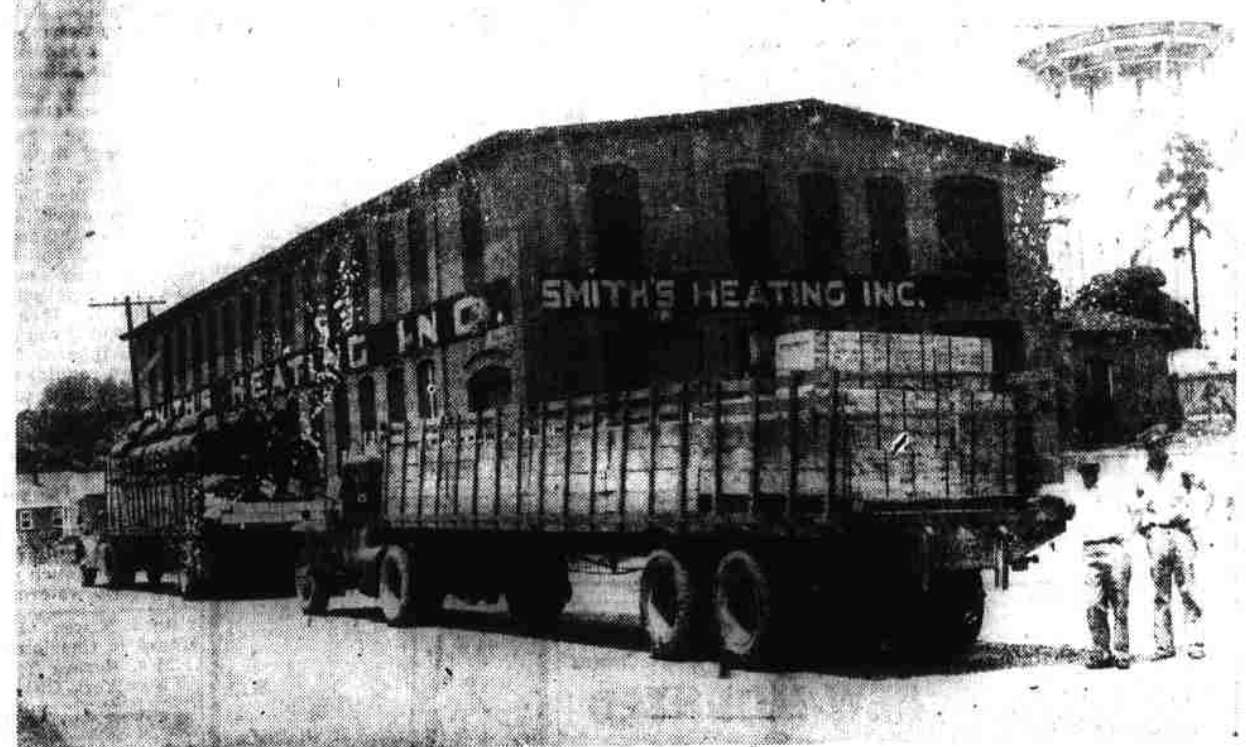
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
