QUESTION: Who is eligible to vote in the flue-cured tobacco quota referendum on July 19?  
ANSWER: Any person who has an interest in the 1952 crop of flue-cured tobacco as owner, tenant, or shareholder, is eligible to vote in this referendum.

QUESTION: May a person who has more than one farm producing flue-cured tobacco vote for each farm?  
ANSWER: No. Each individual is entitled to only one vote.

QUESTION: Must a person vote in his own community?  
ANSWER: Every person is expected to vote in the community in which his main farming activities are located. If he has a farm in another community, he may vote in either place but can't vote in both places. Any eligible voter, however, can vote in any community he wishes, but his ballot may be challenged if his name isn't on the list in that community.

QUESTION: What questions will appear on the ballot?  
ANSWER: Growers will vote on

being the same lands conveyed by L. P. Best and wife, and H. F. Pierce and wife, to the Trustees of Pierce Street Presbyterian Church, by a Deed recorded in Book 149, page 591; and also by a corrected deed dated July 31, 1915, and recorded in Book 169, page 206, both of the Public Registry of Duplin County.
