Faison Corn Crops Attacked By Coons

Farmers living along the Goshen swamp near here have suffered heavy losses in their corn crops this year because of coons, according to Durwood Murray, member of the firm of Murray Supply Company.

Murray said there was plenty of evidence that some of the culprit's were the largest coons seen in this section in years. The smaller coons were said to be eating the corn right off the stalks, while the larger animals are breaking and carrying ears off, presumably to their dens.

This suggested, Murray said, that this area of Faison should be excellent coon hunting territory next fall.

One of the worst hit farmers was Rufe Best, who lives on the Bill Kalmar farm. He reported not only seeing tracks of the animals, but also of seeing coons scurrying out of his corn field on several occasions.

Purely Political

If you are going to listen to the Democratic convention in Chicago next week—and who isn't—it might be well to keep in mind the names of the eligible candidates. At this writing no presidential hopeful has enough votes for nomination on the first ballot. Unless there is a lot of trading between now and then, we might easily have six ballots. It is a wide open race—and the Vice Presidential choice is anyone's guess.

The party leaders would like to have either Harry Truman or Governor Adlai Stevenson win the nomination. Both of them have said they don't want it—but if there were a genuine draft, either one might change his mind.

A major contender for the nomination is Richard Russell of Georgia who will probably get at least 28 on Carolina's 32 votes on the first ballot. He might get many more than the some 118 votes already pledged to him. He is 54 years old, ranks second in delegate strength and is highly respected as Chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee. He has almost complete backing from the solid South, and he would probably carry the South including Texas in the November election. But—and it is a large but—many Northern States will oppose him

because of his stand on civil rights. The leading candidate in already pledged delegate strength is Estes Kefauver. He is in a border state, has fought strongly against crime and corruption and political boss Crump, he has an attractive family. But he has received strong opposition from party leaders, especially those in large cities. He is only 48 years old.

If he were younger, Alben Barkley, 74, could have the nomination for the asking. He is a border state man acceptable to both party factions—but his age is against him.

Another candidate is Robert S. Kerr from Oklahoma, who ranks fourth in delegate strength. His opposition to the civil rights program would hurt his chances in the North.

Averell Harriman who is 60 ranks about third in delegate strength. He has wide experience in foreign affairs, but the South does not like him. His divorce and his family's big business connections are against him.

Paul H. Douglas, 60, has the advantage of being not only a lawyer but a top-rank economist—he says he does not want the nomination. His fight for economy is on his side, but his divorce would not make him acceptable to the Catholic vote—and the Catholic vote is of paramount importance to the Democrats.

Other dark horse candidates are Oscar Ewing, Fulbright of Arkansas, Fred Vinson, James Farley, Gov. Paul Dever of Mass., Gov. Mennen Williams of Michigan, Oscar Chapman, Sam Rayburn, Stuart Symington, Brian McMahon, John Sparkman.

You can take your choice. The fight will certainly not be as bitter as the one that marked the Republican convention, but it should

be a good show. The Democrats must pick a candidate who can carry all the party votes—because for once the Republicans have a man who has caught the imagination of the people, who is very popular, and a man strong enough to carry some states always conceded to be Democratic.
