Seventh Annual Tennis Tournament To Be Held

The seventh annual Eastern Carolina Tennis Tournament will be held in Raleigh, North Carolina on August 13-17, 1952. The tournament is to be sponsored by the Eastern Carolina Tennis Association in cooperation with the Raleigh Recreation Department.

Entry blanks may be obtained by writing Fred West, Tournament Director, 718 Hillsboro Street, Raleigh, North Carolina or through local recreation departments in Eastern North Carolina.

All residents of Eastern Carolina are eligible for the tournament. Eastern Carolina's western most counties have been defined as including Person, Orange, Durham, Chatham, Moore, Cumberland Lee, Hoke, and Scotland. Military personnel are ineligible unless they are members of the Eastern Carolina Tennis Association or permanent residents of this area prior to entering military service.

There will be play in men's singles and doubles, women's singles and doubles, and veterans' doubles. Trophies will be presented to winners and runners-up in each division.

Entries for all events must be received by the Tournament Director no later than noon on August 8, 1952. Seeding and pairings will be drawn up on the night of August 8, in Goldsboro, North Carolina.
