## Students Advised Apply For December 4 Selective Service College Qualification

Manass, North Carolina, October 2, 1952. Students are advised to apply for the December 4, 1952 Selective Service College Qualification Test immediately in a communication received today by Presbyterian Junior College from Selective Service Examining Section of the Educational Testing Service. Presbyterian Junior College has been designated a testing center again this year and will give the tests on December 4, 1952 and April 23, 1953, but only those students who are assigned by their local boards after sending in an application may take the test. Students passing the test may continue in college as long as they do satisfactory work and will not be drafted until after graduation. The communication from Educational Testing Service states: "Applications for the December 4, 1952 and the April 23, 1953 administrations of the College Qualification Test are now available at Selective Service System local boards throughout the country. Eligible students who intend to offer this test on either date should apply at once to the nearest Selective Service local board for an application and a bulletin of information. Following instructions in the bulletin, the student should fill out his application and mail it immediately in the envelope provided. Applications for the December 4 test must be postmarked not later than midnight, November 1, 1952. According to Educational Testing Service, which prepares and administers the College Qualification Test for the Selective Service System, it will be greatly to the student's advantage to file his application at once, regardless of the testing date he selects. The results will be reported to the student's Selective Service board of jurisdiction for use in considering his deferment as a student."
