Duplin Casts Largest Vote In History; Republicans Sweep Nation

Latest reports from the National election as we go to press shows that General Dwight D. Eisenhower, Republican candidate for President had won 39 states to Stevenson's 9. Stevenson carried North Carolina, South Carolina, Arkansas; Louisiana; Mississippi; Georgia; Kentucky and West Virginia and Alabama. The Republicans also won control of both the House of Representatives and the Senate. Governor-elect Wm. B. Umstead and the entire state Democratic ticket won easily in North Carolina. All Democratic congressmen were elected except one, Chas. A. Jones, Republican of Lincolnston defeated Congressman Hamilton Jones of Charlotte.

The last time the country went Republican was in 1928 when Herbert Hoover defeated Al Smith by a landslide in proportions carrying all but 14 states. Eisenhower polled the largest popular vote ever given a candidate in this country. His latest vote at press time was 31,024,749 to Stevenson's 24,940,441. He racked up a vote of over one half million in North Carolina. This state set a voting record by casting well over a million votes. Stevenson lead in Tar Heels by less than 100,000.

The following is a breakdown of the Duplin County vote: We are giving the precinct votes for governor, president, congress and county officers. First figure is Democratic and second figure Republican.

Other state races ran about the same. The County voted in favor of all three constitutional amendments.

Oliver A. Horne, 48 year old Duplin County deputy sheriff and jailer, died in a Kinston hospital about 9:15 p.m. Monday after suffering a lingering heart ailment.

A former Beulville resident, he lived at Kenansville and had served as Duplin County jailer for three years. He had been a law enforcement officer for 10 years.

The funeral was conducted at 2 p.m. this afternoon from the graveside of the family cemetery at the family home place near Beulville. Rev. Stephen Smith of Middlesex was assisted by Rev. W. H. Willis of Kinston. Both are Free Will Baptist ministers.

Horne was a member of the Beulville Free Will Baptist Church and of the North Carolina Sheriff's Association.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Mattie Kennedy Horne; two daughters, Mrs. Wayne Stillley of Trenton and Mrs. Robert Price of Philadelphia, Pa.; one son, Allen Horne of Beulville; his mother, Mrs. Allis Horne of the home; one sister, Mrs. Albert Carter of Beulville; and five grandchildren.

Duplin County Soldier Killed In Auto Wreck; Served 10 1-2 Months Overseas

Cpl. Benjamin Parrott Waters, Jr., 20, was killed near Morgantown, Tuesday morning when the car in which he and his brother, John K. Waters, 10, were riding went out of control. Corporal Waters was dead on arrival at a Va. hospital. The younger brother was taken to the U. S. Air Force Camp Stone Mountain, Ga., escaped injury.

The son of Mrs. Louise Stroud Waters of Albemarle and the late Mr. Waters, the young soldier had served two years in the U. S. Army during 1942-44, in the Pacific Campaign. He was returning to his base at Fort Knox, Ky., from a furlough when he met his death.

Last rites were conducted at 4 p.m. Wednesday from the graveside at Dalley's Chapel Free Will Baptist Church near Sewa Springs. A Free Will Baptist minister officiated and interment was in the church cemetery.

Surviving in addition to his mother and younger brother, are a half brother, J. E. Waters of New Bern; two sisters, Maxine Waters of Kinston and Mary Louise Waters at the home; and a half sister, Mrs. Leroy Banks of New Bern.

Brigadier General William S. Fellers To Deliver Armistice Address At Warsaw

Camp Lejeune, N. C. — Brigadier General William S. Fellers, deputy camp commander here, will give the address at the Armistice Day celebration at Warsaw, N. C. The festivities planned for next Tuesday, Nov. 11, include a parade at 11 o'clock which will be witnessed from the reviewing stand by General Fellers and local officials.

After the ceremony General Fellers will attend a luncheon to be given in his honor.

Brigadier General William Stanley Fellers Deputy Camp Commander, Camp Lejeune, N. C., enlisted in December, 1917 as a private. By the time he had advanced to the rank of gunnery sergeant he was sent to the Marine Corps Officers' Training Camp and was commissioned a second lieutenant on December 15, 1918.

General Fellers was born December 18, 1893, at Cincinnati, Ohio and attended the University of Cincinnati and the Georgia School of Technology. During World War I he was general of the Legion of Merit and Gold Star in lieu of a second Legion of Merit. The first award came while serving as an assistant evacuation officer with the First Marine Division during the Quindici campaign and the second while serving in the same capacity during the Cape Gloucester operation.

Camp Lejeune's Deputy Commander has served with distinction with various Marine activities all over the world and in addition to previously mentioned awards holds the Presidential Unit Citation with Expeditionary Medal with two Bronze Stars, Second Nicaraguan Campaign Medal, American Defense Service Medal with Fleet Clasp, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal with four Bronze Stars, American Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, Navy Occupation Service Medal and the Nicaraguan Medal of Distinction with Diploma.

General Fellers is married to Mrs. Ellison B. Fellers. They have two children, Ellison B., age 29, and William S. Jr., age 25.

The factory manufactures low priced cotton dresses that sell throughout Eastern United States. It maintains a New York selling office.

Mr. Epstein had the factory going at full force last night with the approximately 50 sewing machines at work. They are all manned by white women. Mr. Merritt of Magnolia was busy cutting materials from patterns. He drew much attention as he would skim along with his electric cutting machine cutting a stack of material about 12 inches thick, exactly as directed to pattern each stroke.

Refreshments were served at the front door to all guests as they entered and so they left.

300 Duplin Veterans Discuss AMVET Bonus Proposal In Meet Here Last Night; Rep. Carr And Sen. Vann Present

Around three hundred Duplin County Veterans of World Wars I, II and the Korean campaign assembled in the court house here last night to discuss questions and issues involved in the AMVET program to secure a bonus for the North Carolina veterans. This figure, it was reported, represented about 10 per cent of all the Duplin veterans. Representative Robert M. Carr of Wallace and Senator Henry Vann of Clinton were present to listen in on the discussion. They did not participate.

Colon Holland, Commander of the Duplin AMVETS presided in a very capable manner and conducted what was said to be one of the most orderly and practical meetings ever held in the court house where issues of public money being paid out were concerned.

Mr. Holland made the principle speech, explaining the program of the AMVETS and called for open discussion. Many present took part and propounded sensible questions in an effort to thrash out the issues as they involved the veterans and the tax payers. Senator Vann and Representative Carr after the meeting was over, paid high compliment to Mr. Holland and the entire group for the manner in which the meeting went off. They requested that Duplin County Service Officer Ribenback work out and produce figures as to the amount it would cost to pay the Duplin County veterans. The program calls for payments as follows: \$20 per month, not to exceed \$750 to overseas veterans \$14 per month not to exceed \$500 for domestic veterans and a maximum payment to families of deceased veterans in both classes.

Tobacco Plant Bed Treatment Meeting To Be Held At LeRoy Simmons' Farm Friday

There will be a meeting at Mr. LeRoy Simmons' farm at Albertson, on Friday, November 7, at 3 p.m. to demonstrate the treatment of tobacco plant beds for weed control and nematodes with Methyl Bromide. Methyl Bromide is a gas treatment which must be applied under a 200 proof cover and is left on the bed for 24 to 48 hours. This treatment can be applied when the air temperature is above 55 degrees any time from now up to a few days before sowing seed. All tobacco growers are invited to attend this meeting.

Governor Scott Sets Crop Week

At ceremonies last week in his office the Honorary Chairman of the North Carolina State CROP Committee, Governor W. Kerr Scott, named November 9th as CROP Sunday and November 9-15 as CROP Week, when the annual solicitation of gifts for starvation areas of the world will be made.

In the presence of Commissioner of Agriculture, L. Y. Ballentine, State CROP Committee Chairman, and others Governor Scott presented the Proclamation to the State CROP Director Rev. Carl R. Key, of Durham.

Governor Scott stated that "CROP Sunday is the day when the Ministers and Church Membership emphasize the purpose and program of CROP and prepare their hearts and minds for giving of that which they have grown with their own hands to alleviate suffering, to save lives of needy neighbors overseas, to build peace and friendship."

"CROP Week", declared the Governor, "is the week when most of the counties support CROP; a farm to farm canvass to secure the gifts of life-sustaining food which is assembled in carload lots and shipped for overseas feeding."

"The aim of CROP is to save lives, a store house for peace, the people will respond if they know just how they can help — how they can share in the total job."

Governor Scott strongly urged all "rural" people to give their wholehearted support to CROP. He concluded by saying, "We want to help the man who is in distress and down and out. Let us not take this program lightly. It is a Christian thing for Americans to do for persons when they are in need and in distress."

Crop Canvass Slated For Next Two Weeks

As CROP, Sunday Nov. 9th approaches, four counties lead in goals set it was announced by the Rev. Carl R. Key, Durham: State CROP Director. They are Forsyth, Harnett, Mecklenburg and Martin Counties.

Forsyth County seeks a car of powdered milk valued at \$7,650. Harnett County set a goal of 50 bales of cotton worth \$7,500. Mecklenburg seeks 25 bales of cotton estimated at \$3,750. Martin County is canvassing for 300 bags of peanuts valued at \$3,600.

The 21 counties expected to canvass in the next two weeks have fixed a goal of one train carload each of corn, wheat, cotton, peanuts, or powdered milk. Total goals set for all counties are now valued at \$60,500.00. As other counties report goals, indications are that the \$3,000 average per county will be maintained.

Other counties included in this list are Durham, Beaufort, Craven; Granville; Wake; Cabarrus; Wayne; Wilson; Guilford; Robeson; Union; Cleveland; Gaston; Lincoln; Rutherford; Orange and Stanly. Seventeen other counties are expected to report goals in the next few days. Most of the canvassing will be done the week of November 9-15. A few counties will canvass later in the month of November.

Mr. Key was quite optimistic over the final total of carload gifts. He stated that he fully expected the counties to accept 30 carloads valued at some \$75,000.00.

So far the large single gift to the 1952 North Carolina CROP drive was made by Mrs. G. S. Proctor, Bethesda Road, Aberdeen. Mrs. Proctor donated two acres of corn. Arrangements are now being made to harvest the corn to be credited to the Moore County goal.
