## 10,450 Traffic Violators Get Tickets In Sept.

Raleigh Highway Patrol Commander W. B. Lentz reported today that his men arrested 10,450 North Carolina traffic law violators in September and issued citations to 6,758 others.

In a regular monthly summary of patrol activities Col. Lentz said his 525 troopers inspected 149,105 drivers' licenses; issued 10,154 warning tickets; corrected 26,935 defective lights; investigated 7,017 complaints; and weighed 630 vehicles in cooperation with the License and Theft Enforcement Bureau.

In addition to its enforcement duties the patrol handed out 18,091 courtesies—changing tires, giving road directions, assisting motorists in distress, etc.

The officers traveled 1,750,712 miles on routine patrol in September using 120,899 gallons of gasoline and 1,139 quarts of oil. They recovered stolen cars and property valued at \$97,600 and fines and costs collected in their court cases amounted to \$285,875.75.

## Safety Council To Meet Raleigh

Winston Salem, Nov. 3 — The Council of Safety Supervisors of the North Carolina Motor Carriers Association will hold their first meeting of the new year in Raleigh, November 7th.

The new council chairman, J. Kelly Stewart, in announcing the meeting here today said, "We cannot rest our laurels — we must map plans for an even expanded 1953-1954 truck safety promotional program."

He stated that the business session and luncheon would begin at 11:00 a.m. Friday in the Sir Walter Hotel.

The Council is made up of representative safety and personnel Directors from the Association's member companies and representatives from insurance companies. In addition to overall program planning, the agenda calls for discussion on the changes in the National and State Roadside rules and the roadside driver's club.

## Wayne Hospital Offering Courses Practical Nursing

The Wayne County Memorial Hospital School of Practical Nursing in Goldsboro, N. C. is now offering a 12 month course to Negro female women. The class will begin February 2, 1953. Twenty students will be accepted in this class.

To be eligible for entrance, applicants must be between the ages of 17-45 years of age, a pleasing personality, in good health and a good moral character. High school graduates are preferred. Students are furnished meals while on duty and laundry of uniforms will be training. Rooms will not be furnished to students due to the lack of housing facilities.

A tuition fee is not charged for the course but students are required to pay for their uniforms and books which is approximately \$45. After the fourth month of training students will receive a stipend of \$20 for four months and \$30 for the remaining four months, totaling \$200 while in training.

A certificate will be given upon graduation and the graduates will be eligible to take the North Carolina State Board Examination to obtain a license as a Practical Nurse.

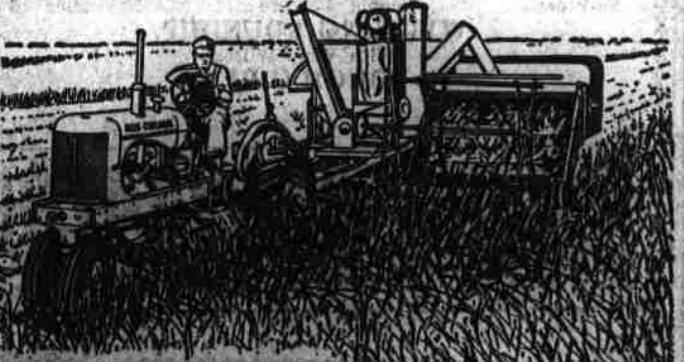

## Air Force To Display Jet Aircraft And Equipment At Pope Field On November 8

One of the largest displays of the Air Force conventional and jet aircraft and equipment ever offered in the Carolinas will be shown during the 70th Anniversary celebration of the Tactical Air Command's Ninth Air Force at Pope Air Force Base, November 8. General Timberlake, Commanding General of the Ninth Air Force who is making the display open to the public said, "I believe that every taxpayer should have the opportunity to periodically inspect and touch equipment he has helped purchase and to talk personally with those men in uniform who are charged with the defense of this country."

Almost every type of jet and piston engine aircraft used in Korea and in the Ninth Air Force will be displayed. During the middle part of the afternoon there will be a helicopter demonstration and a rocket assisted take off by a Sabrejet.

One of the most unusual exhibits offered the public will be the XF-85 experimental jet fighter. General Timberlake said, "The XF-85 is notable in the field of aviation in that it has no landing gear. It is designed to be carried within the bomb bay of a larger craft. It is lowered and released from the bomber in flight. After completing its flight the XF-85 returns to the mother craft, hooks onto it, and is lifted again into the bomb bay."

The Ninth Air Force, with headquarters at Pope Air Force Base, in the heart of North Carolina, distinguished itself during World War II with the most outstanding combat record in the Air Force. General Timberlake, is a veteran of the Korean Air War, decorated for his achievements during the early days of the conflict when the Air Force there played an all important role in keeping our forces on the peninsula. General Timberlake was also a member of the Ninth Air Force during World War II.

derjets, Shooting Stars, Mustangs, Thunderbolts and all the different types of troop carrier aircraft of the Tactical Air Command. This will include the giant C-124. The B 29, famed World War II bomber, will be exhibited along with more than a dozen different type training aircraft and helicopters.

A special group of exhibits from the Air Age Education office at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, will be on hand with cut away jet and piston engines. These engines are electrically operated to afford spectators with a view of their interior operation. Also included are special displays of Psychological Warfare and the Tactical Air Command.

The Air Age Education Office's USAF Orientation Group, bringing the exhibits to Pope Air Force Base, is a special organization which tours the country bringing educational displays to the public.
