

Students ae furnished meals while on duty and laundry of uniforms while in training. Rooms will not be fur-nished to students due to the lack of housing facilities.

A tuition fee is not charged for the course but students are required to pay for their uniforms books which is approximately \$45. After the fourth month of training students will receive a stipend of \$20 for four months and \$30 for the remaining four months, totaling

\$200 while in training.
