Rose Hill Community Library Receives Over 200 Volumes

More than 200 volumes have been contributed by friends to the Rose Hill Community Memorial Library in the past year, Mrs. Lula S. Herring, librarian stated recently while discussing the present plans and facilities of the small permanent collection of literature which supplements the volumes placed periodically by the county library.

In planning for ways and means of enlarging our permanent collection and service, Mrs. Herring continued, we decided to follow the example of other successful libraries and purchase memorial book plates to encourage contributions, since we have no funds with which to purchase books and periodicals in order to develop and maintain adequate service to our reading public.

The library is very glad to announce that these handsome book plates—1000 of them—have recently arrived. The bookplates will record, in the frontispiece of any volume contributed, the name of the person who is being remembered and the name of the person contributing the volume as a memorial. In addition, the library has also purchased donor cards which are to be sent to the family of the remembered one, announcing the gift and the donor's name.

The donor may select and purchase the volume to be presented or may contribute a sum to a member of the library committee for selection and purchase, Mrs. Herring continued. It would be better to clear with the librarian first in order to avoid duplications, she added.

The librarian expects many persons will be very glad of the opportunity to remember friends and loved ones in this more permanent way. A number of volumes have recently been received as gifts in memoriam. The most recent acquisitions are four memorial volumes presented in memory of the late Mr. Carl Reid and are being processed for the shelves by the county librarian, Miss Dorothy Williams. The titles are "THE PROPHET AND JESUS THE SON OF MAN," both by the famous Lebanese mystic-poet Kahlil Gibran; "TONY'S SCRAP BOOK" (2nd three in one volume) by Tony Wons; and "TOM PAINE, AMERICA'S GOD-FATHER," by W. E. Woodward.

Several others have been presented to the family of the late Mrs. Cume Mallard Fussell which will become permanent additions to the library.

Brother Of Helen Hunt Dies In Naples, Fla.

John Dea Hunt, age 42, died en route from Naples to a hospital in Fort Myers, Fla. Thursday morning, October 30th. He was born in Oxford the son of the late Sheriff E. D. Hunt and Cora Parabow Hunt.

Mr. Hunt was for 25 years connected with the Bell Leggett shop. He served four years over sea duty in World War II, after which he moved to Magnolia where he was in business until he moved to Florida because of failing health. He was a member of the Masonic lodge in Oxford, Elks in Goldsboro, American Legion in Warsaw, Past President of the Lions Club in Magnolia; Magnolia Town Commissioner and Steward in the Magnolia Methodist Church.

He is survived by his wife the former Bettie Heath of Magnolia and a four year son, Patrick, three sisters, Lucille of Colowee; Helen and Alice Hunt of Magnolia.

His brother, James W. Hunt, passed away September 30th 1951 and was buried in Arlington Memorial Cemetery in Washington, D.C. Funeral services were held in Oxford Methodist church Sunday, November 2nd at 3 o'clock. Burial was in the Oxford Cemetery.
