Members of the new rehabilitation committee of the Lenoir County Tuberculosis Association named recently included Mrs. Jasper Smith of Pink Hill.

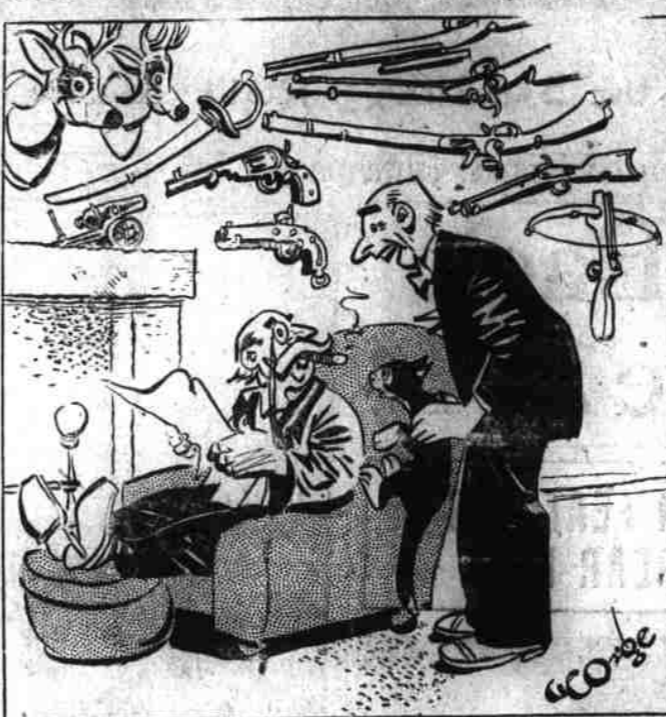
Miss Davis Patient Lenoir Hospital

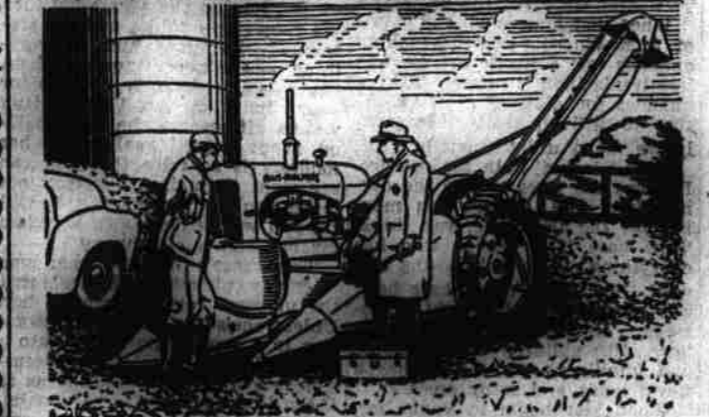
