State Colleges Hints to Homemakers
WARDROBE? Never buy any garment — no matter how attractive — unless you know that it fits into your entire clothes plan.
 Follow these steps in planning each season's wardrobe:
 (1) Take an inventory of your clothes on hand. Try on each garment for fit and style.
 (2) Accessories should be checked, too. Right accessories are important. They are so important that they can make any outfit just right or otherwise!
 (3) Give the clothes you can't wear to some worthy person or organization. It would be kind or thoughtful if you could repair or resell them.
 (4) Plan your new purchases for the entire season, using your inventory as a guide. Be sure that each purchase fills a specific "gap" in your wardrobe and is in harmony with your color and style scheme. For example, if you need a sports dress, you should keep in mind your sports coat when you buy it. If your coat is green tweed, choose a dress in brown, rust or some other harmonizing color. Select a sports fabric like rayon gabardine or twill.
 (5) Decide on the amount of money to be allowed for each purchase. You can get a good idea of current price ranges for various types of clothes by consulting newspaper and magazine advertisements.
 Finally: Make a shopping list for the entire season — and stick to it. Don't indulge in that pretty

Save Your Health And Money By Having Hogs Tested For Brucellosis

With many farmers buying hogs for fall breeding the American Foundation for Animal Health warns that the animals should be tested for brucellosis both as family health measure and as insurance for a better spring pig crop.
 Dr. C. D. Grinnells, department of animal husbandry, N. C. State College, points out that undulant fever among farm families is often traced to swine that have been infected with brucellosis. To guard his families health and pocketbook the wise farmer will blood test his hogs on his farm, Grinnells added.
 The Foundation for Animal Health recommends that hogs which react to the blood test either be sent to slaughter or kept in isolation, depending on the veterinarian's judgement. Further tests should then be continued at regular periods until no reactors are found.
 If any breeding swine show signs of bad joints or lameness the Foundation also recommends that they be given a health check-up. Lameness and defective joints can be symptoms of crystalin, infectious arthritis, brucellosis, or nutritional deficiencies. Foundation spokesmen point out that accurate diagnosis is necessary to determine the nature of the disease so steps may be taken to protect the rest of the drove.
