Jarman quoted Miss Howard as saying the car was do-ing 90 miles per hour as it ap-broached the curve. Thigpen suffered a broken shoulder and Miss Howard was also hurt However, she was able to return to her home without hos-



A bill to be entitled an act to rewrite G. S. 20-7 (d) relating to the issuance of operators' licenses. The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact: Section 1 G. S. 20-7 (d) is hereby

rewritten to read as follows: "G. S. 20-7(d). The Department

shall cause each person who has heretofore been issued an operator's license to be examined or reexamined, as the case may be, to determine whether or not such person is physically and mentally cap able of safely operating motor veable of safely operating motor ve-hicles over the highways of the State. Those persons found, as a esult of such an examination or re-examination, to be capable of

safely operating motor vehicles ov er the highways of the State shall be refizied operators' licenises, and those persons found to be in-capable of safely operating motor vehicles over the highways of the A. C HoHand, Commander of vehicles over the highways of the State shall not be reissued operators' licenses. The examination required by this subsection may include such road tests, oral, and in the case of literate applicants, written tests and tests of vision, as the Department may require.
