Language Arts To Be Offered In Negro School, Warsaw

We shall begin a new term of instruction on Thursday, March 26, 1936 in the Extension Class for Negro Teachers held in the Douglass High school, Warsaw, N. C.

The course to be offered is Language Arts. The course is divided into three sections: Section One—Directing Pupil's Experiences in Oral Communication. Section Two—Directing Pupil's Experiences in Written Communication.

Section Three—Improving Pupil's Language Experiences and Expression Throughout the School.

The course offers two hours of credit toward an A. B. or M. A. Degree and toward renewing or raising a teacher's certificate.

Again, registration will be held on March 26th at Douglass High school, Warsaw, N. C. The registration fee is one dollar, and the tuition is eleven dollars. The class begins at 4:00 p. m. and ends at 7:30 p. m. Dr. W. J. McKee from the University of North Carolina is the instructor.

The two courses previously taught by Dr. McKee were very interesting and they offered each classroom teacher, in both the elementary and high school, many

modern principles and practices in progressive education.
