

QUESTION: "What are the best steps to take in controlling termites?"

ANSWER: The species of termite that causes the most damage in North Carolina is the subterranean termite. This "nesting type" insect thrives on wood. But it can not live without moisture. Being a subterranean insect, it lives in the soil, according to George D. Jones, in charge of extension entomology.

The number one step to take in combating termites is to make sure no wooden parts of buildings reach the ground unless they are thoroughly treated. This means that no wooden scraps should be used to fill in areas around the foundation. Stumps and wood scraps should not be left under the building. Wooden supports and foundation walls should rest upon a concrete footing and not be permitted to extend through the concrete to the gravel below. Openings in the foundation wall will help remove the moisture under the building, without which the termite will move on to a more desirable location.

The use of a foundation shield to cover foundation walls and piers is good, but be sure to seal each joint of the shield.

Chemicals should be used when termites begin attacking foundation timbers or flooring. Removal of "soil tracks" (small tunnels constructed by termites as passages from the soil to the wood) and ventilation will usually help a great deal. But it will also help to treat the soil. Good outside drainage is also helpful. To apply chemicals, dig a narrow trench next to the foundation under the building. Use about one gallon of 5 per cent DDT and oil, a 5 per cent pentachlorophenol-oil mixture or a creosote-oil product to saturate each three or five linear feet of the trench.

QUESTION: "Is fire an effective way to control boll weevils?"

ANSWER: No! Fifty years of experience has shown that the only effective way to control boll weevils is to fight them in the field with recommended sprays and dusts. You can burn down all your barns and outbuildings, your haystacks and stored corn, woodpiles and stacks of refuse, and then get all your neighbors to do the same and you have only wasted your time. Even after these favorite hibernation places, plus woodlands bordering your fields, you would destroy only a very small percentage of the wintering weevils. Fire is not the answer.

QUESTION: "How can I avoid blight in my cotton this spring?"

ANSWER: Feed them simple roughage before turning them out to pasture. Cattle are usually hungry just before eating wet, succulent pasture. This naturally causes them to eat too much, too quickly, causing a gastric condition to develop which may kill the animal quickly if proper treatment is not given promptly. Another good suggestion would be to let the morning dew dry before turning your cattle out on new, heavy growths of pasture.

QUESTION: "How much water should my dairy cows get?"

ANSWER: Water is one of the cheapest dairy cattle feeds, yet it is often a limiting factor to high milk production. Water makes up 70 to 80 per cent of the animal's body, acids in circulating the digested food materials in the body, carries waste products away, helps control body temperature and makes up about 87 per cent of the milk itself. From three to five gallons of water are required by a cow for each gallon of milk she produces. When cows have free access to water they will drink much more than when they are watered only once or twice daily. Cows are thirsty after they have eaten dry feed and clean fresh water should always be available for them.
