

QUESTION: Is the electric light trap for the control of hornworm moths in tobacco practical?
ANSWER: Research done so far leads to indicate that the use of such a light does not materially affect the number of worms nor the number of injured plants in a given area.

QUESTION: How can I control wild growths of honeysuckle?
ANSWER: Honeysuckle can be fairly well controlled by the use of the equivalent of two pounds of 2, 4-D acid in 100 gallons of solution when the solution is applied as a wetting spray to the foliage. The amine form of 2, 4-D should

be used. Be careful not to get any of the material on your flowers or ornamental plants.
QUESTION: How can I get rid of a swarm of bees in my house wall?
ANSWER: Clapboard buildings usually afford excellent places for bees to settle. It is very easy to make the bees go away if discovered early. Simply use household spray, kerosene, gasoline or carbolic acid swabbed or sprayed around the entrance and the bees will take the hint and leave. If the swarm is of long standing, take away the queen.

**N. C. Price Index Drops 5 Points
 Index Of Grain Prices Off 17 Points**

Raleigh, N. C., July 2, 1935 — At mid-June the index of prices received by North Carolina farmers stood at 259 percent of the 1910-14 average — a drop of 5 points (2 percent) from mid-May. This is the lowest point reached by all the All Commodity Index since July 15, 1931. Prices received by N. C. farmers for most commodities during the month were lower than the previous month. The poultry and egg index was the only commodity group reflecting an increase for the period ended June 15 — the result of an increase in egg prices.

**Ignore Hitchhikers,
 Motor Club Warns**

An urgent and serious warning that vacationing motorists avoid picking up hitchhikers was sounded here by Coleman W. Roberts, president of the Carolina Motor Club.

"Don't take the risk of completely ruining your vacation trip by gambling on a hitchhiker," urged the motor club official. "This practice, as the American Automobile Association points out again and again, is really one of the nuisances of the roadside and many a would-be good Samaritan ended up without his cash or without his car. Even worse, in some cases drivers have been badly beaten or murdered.

"Many plead poverty or necessity, but anyone who actually needs transportation can get help from the Travelers Aid Society, or similar welfare organization. As for men in uniform, they are prohibited, by regulation, from seeking a lift, except at regularly established 'pick-up stations.'"

Besides warning that uniformed hitchhikers may be impostors, Mr. Roberts cited a statement by General J. Lawton Collins, former Army Chief of Staff, that: "Hitchhiking or 'thumbing of rides' by military personnel is unmilitary, a discredit to the service and in certain localities a violation of state law."

The motor club official also quoted FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover, in this stern warning: "Unfortunately, there is no way to distinguish dangerous criminals by their looks and there is no such thing as a 'criminal type.' Men and women in prison garb are easy to identify, but in civilian clothes they look, talk, and seem like the rest of us."

Warm Humid Weather

The recent warm, humid weather over the Tar Heel State has been "ideal" for the rapid spread of late blight, a disease that could cripple North Carolina's home grown tomato crop.

Farmers and home gardeners alike were warned recently that the disease that causes the foliage of the tomato plant to turn off the stems and the ripe and unripe fruit to become infested with brownish-black rotten spots, can be controlled by periodic dusting or spraying with fungicides containing metallic copper.

Max A. Culp, Caldwell County farm agent for the N. C. State College Agricultural Extension Service, reminded farmers that the tomato "is probably your favorite vegetable and it should be for the hitchhiker hoodlum is dangerous. The motorist who gambles on being a judge of character may be gambling with his life."

Mr. Roberts also pointed out that in some states the owner of the car is liable for damages in the case of accident involving passengers. This means that if a hitchhiker is injured he can proceed to bring suit against the motorist.

BEEF PINWHEELS with Mustard Sauce
 1 lb. ground beef
 2 med. onions, chopped fine
 1/4 c. celery, chopped fine
 1 egg, beaten
 1/2 c. milk or beef stock
 1 tsp. salt
 1/2 tsp. pepper

STEP 1: Mix all ingredients until well blended. Add more liquid if necessary, to make mixture soft enough to spread easily.

STEP 2: Make a biscuit dough using 2 c. self-rising flour. Roll into a rectangular shape about 1/4" thick. Spread beef mixture on dough to within 1/2" of all edges. Roll as for jelly roll, sealing moistened edges together. With a sharp knife, slice roll into 1/2" thick slices. Place slices cut side down on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 425° for 20-25 minutes. Serve with mustard sauce made by adding 1 Tbsp. prepared mustard to 1 c. medium white sauce. Serves six.
