Cottage Cheese

Hotmakers across North Carolina are discovering many new and wonderful ways to use cottage cheese.

This nutritious dairy product is becoming particularly popular in the diets of those who are trying to lose weight, says Jewell Fessenden, State College extension nutritionist. A scant half-cup of cottage cheese contains about 100 calories. But in addition a half cup of cottage cheese will furnish 55 per cent of your daily requirement of protein, 10 per cent of your day's needs of calcium and 15 per cent of your day's need of riboflavin, and one of the important B-complex vitamins.

This cheese, however, needn't always be confined to the low calorie diet. Here is a recipe for a tempting cottage cheese pie offered by two of the 4-H girls who entered the state dairy-foods demonstration contest. And one of the advantages of this pie is that its flavor can be varied; and in addition, it can be made well ahead of serving time and stored in the refrigerator:

COTTAGE CHEESE PIE

1/4 Cup fruit
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 beaten egg
2 tablespoons orange gelatin
2 tablespoons lemon gelatin
3/4 cup whipping cream
1 cup cottage cheese
1 baked pie shell

Combine fruit, sugar, salt and beaten egg. Thicken over a medium heat. Add gelatin. Fold in the whipped cream. Mix in cottage cheese with the flavor of the fruit to be used and two tablespoons of lemon gelatin. For instance, if you were making a strawberry pie, you would use two tablespoons of strawberry gelatin and two tablespoons of lemon gelatin.

Now's the Time to Preserve Season's Fruits, Vegetables

BOUNTIFUL supplies of fruits and vegetables extend a hearty invitation to do a bit of canning. And you don't have to be a country gal to do up batches of preserves. No, indeed! A city child we know, whose apartment boasts only a kitchenette, turns out perfectly delicious items.

Old-Fashioned Spiced Damson Plums are favorites, easy to make and really delicious accompaniments for pork or beef. The recipe calls for 4 lbs. plums.

Spiced Damson Plums

Combine one c. cider vinegar, 3 t. sugar, 1/2 tsp. each ground cloves, ground cinnamon and ground allspice. Bring to boil in a preserving kettle. Then add plums and simmer gently until skins crack but fruit is still whole. Pack plums carefully in hot, sterilized jars, then fill with syrup. Seal immediately.

Another fine good for meat is Tomato Mince-meat.

Peel and chop 1 1/2 pts. tart apples. Mix with one pt. chopped green tomatoes, 3 tsp. cinnamon, 1/2 tsp. each salt, allspice and cloves, 3 t. sugar, one pound raisins, 1/4 c. vinegar and one c. stout. Bring to boil and simmer until thick.

Old-Time Favorite

Watermelon Pickle is an old-time favorite. Here is a new and excellent version:

Chop Very Fine
Pit (do not peel) one lb. fully ripe apricots. Cut into small pieces and chop or grind very fine.

Measure 3 c. into a very large saucepan. Add one c. (8-oz. can) crushed pineapple and 1/4 c. lemon juice. Add 1/2 c. sugar and 1/2 tsp. ground allspice. Mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard for one min., stirring constantly. Remove from heat and at once stir in 1/2 bottle fruit pectin.

Skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 min. to cool slightly. (This prevents fruit from floating to top.)

Ladle quickly into glassed. Seal immediately with hot paraffin. Makes about 8 (8-oz.) glasses.

Church Synod To Convene In Wilson Sept. 8-10

Raleigh. The one-hundred-forty-fourth annual meeting of the Synod of North Carolina, Presbyterian Church in the United States, will convene in the First Presbyterian Church, Wilson, September 8-10. The host pastor is the Rev. R. Murphy Williams. The opening session will be held Tuesday, September 8, 8:30 p. m., and will be presided over by the Retiring Moderator, Rev. Albert B. McClure, Superintendent of Barium Springs Orphanage. The Synod will receive annual reports from the Council, headed by Ruling Elder W. E. Price of Charlotte, recommissioned by the Synod, and a balance budget of \$277,110 for the church year 1934, and \$948,700 for Assembly's causes, a total of \$1,225,810; the Executive Committee of Church Extension, A. E. Gibson, Wilmington, Chairman, which will pay tribute to the Rev. O. V. Cassell, who for the past six years has served as Church and Manse building consultant, and who will assume a similar position with the General Assembly of the Church October 1; the Executive Committee of Education, the Rev. W. M. Currie, Greensboro, Chairman, which will present a report on the Education Survey to be made of the Synod's seven institutions; and the following Permanent Committee: Home, Dr. J. Harry Whitmore, Thomasville, Chairman; Inter-Church Relations, Dr. Kelsey Regan, Durham, Chairman; Woman's Work, Rev. J. M. Walker, Roanoke Rapids, Chairman; Annuitants and Relief, Rev. C. M. Gibbs, Fayetteville, Chairman; Minister and His Work, Dr. Sidney A. Gates, Salisbury, Chairman; World Missions, Dr. Edgar Woods, Graham, Chairman; and Assembly's Special Causes, Dr. Harry M. Moffett, Jr., Gastonia, Chairman.

Speakers for the Synod will include the following: Rev. A. B. McClure, retiring Moderator's sermon; Mrs. Rufus D. Wilson, Burlington, President of the Women of the Synod; the Rev. Clifford J. Earle, Philadelphia, Secretary of the Department of Social Education and Action, Board of Christian Education, Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.; the Rev. Joseph B. Kopper, missionary to Korea; John J. Eichorn, Greensboro, representative of the Home Life Insurance Company; Dr. B. Frank Hill, Wrightsville Beach, who will speak in 1933 Christian World Events; the Rev. William B. Faust, Synod's Director of Evangelism; the Rev. Lawrence W. Bottoms, Atlanta, Assistant Director of Negro Work for the General Assembly; the Rev. David M. Currie, Board of Christian Education, Richmond; and the Rev. Harry Smith, Director of Presbyterian Student Work, University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.
