Fertilizer Supply Adequate; Farmers Urged Buy Early

The fertilizer supply for this year looks very favorable in North Carolina, the state whose farmers use more plant food than any other. But the word went out today for farmers to order their supply early.

Our County farm agent for the State College Extension Service, reminded farmers that there frequently are spot shortages of certain favored materials - even in a year of good over-all supply. "The best way to have the right type and the desired amount of fertilizer available when it is needed is to order early."

Tar Heel farmers used 1,850,000 tons of fertilizer during the 1952-53 crop year, slightly less than the preceding year. The state's agricultural leaders have urged farmers to continue to boost their yields by applying plant food "where it is needed in the quantity it is needed."

He says that with sound fertilizer management this year farmers need not worry too much about declining farm prices.

The county agent says a recent USDA report indicates that fertilizer supplied over the nation will be up 11 per cent for the 1953-54 crop year.
