

Fertilizer Concern Plans Location Of Ammonia & Bulk Storage Plant In Area

An anhydrous ammonia and bulk storage plant will locate between Mt. Olive and Calypso in the near future.

After months of negotiations, Jack Linton of Mount Olive and James D. Dickson of Calypso have secured a site for the Standard Fertilizer Company to locate. A deed to part of the Jesse Albritton property south of Mount Olive was signed by those involved in the transaction recently.

Approximately \$70,000 will be invested by the company in equipment and J. C. Cooke of Williamson, a representative of the company, said local men would be trained and employed in the concern. Number of men to be employed has not been disclosed.
